

# Pulse Diagnosis of the Extraordinary Vessels, 6 Channels, and the Compass Method

On Saturday we will cover the basics of extraordinary vessel pulse diagnosis according to the system of Neoclassical Pulse Diagnosis. During this time we will also examine the relationship of the extraordinary vessels to Daoist cosmology and the evolution of consciousness. On Sunday we will learn and practice pulse diagnosis of the 6 channels and the compass method (used to diagnosis elemental imbalances in any pulse position). The system of Neoclassical Pulse Diagnosis relies on relatively easy to grasp pulse methods that are tailored for acupuncture point selection, often leading to the selection of specific points that will immediately balance the pulse and shift the patient's state and/or symptoms. This seminar is designed to give practitioners practical and easy to apply diagnostic and treatment tools that can be immediately implemented to enhance clinical outcomes.

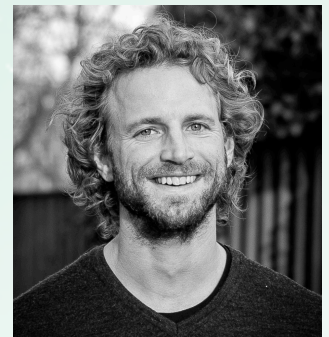
