2015 Legislative Session Summary by IaUW Priorities



Education

- **Pre-K pilot** was continued at \$10 million/year in each budget.
- **Early Education Matching Grants** were continued at \$2 million/year. Funding was in Governor's and House budget but stripped from Senate. IaUW helped lead effort to restore funding.
- laUW worked to raise awareness of need for additional CCDF support to meet growing wait list.

Income/Financial Stability

- Smoothing the Cliff Effect HB1616 passed out of the House and the Senate Family and Children
 Committee and died without a hearing in Appropriations. IaUW testified on this and removal of
 SNAP Asset Limits, both ways to smooth the cliff effect and incentivize work.
- Recoupling State EITC Recoupling provisions (that would have helped married couples and families with three or more children) were not included in final tax revisions, largely due to fiscal impact (\$12 \$15 million). State EITC remains "as is."
- Tax Refund Garnishment Bill sponsors agreed to most provisions suggested by IaUW, ensuring exemptions for intangibles (<\$300), certain types of income (veterans, Social Security), injured or unobligated spousal protections. Bill died.

Health

• IaUW prepared data for the Senate Appropriations Committee related to **HIP and State/Federal exchange issues** for presentation on 3/26.

Strong Communities

- **2-1-1** The budget included \$1 million per year for the two years for Indiana 2-1-1 services. The State joins scores of private funders supporting the statewide system.
- NAP Tax Credits were preserved. IaUW prepared a comprehensive tax credit summary that was used by legislators and lobbied to preserve NAP. IDA Tax Credits were also preserved.
- laUW also weighed in on a bill related to property tax sale transfers to nonprofits.
