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New Malden Catholic Tennis Courts

I recently sat down with our own Mr. Bryan Pinabell to ask him some follow up questions about his first year here at Malden Catholic and what his hopes for the future are.

PD: In review, how would you say your first year at MC went?

BP: I would say it was a tremendous experience, especially being back in the classroom after a few years of holding administrative positions. I love teaching as much as I love coaching, I really feel that those two things are what I'm supposed to be doing in life. I can't believe it took me this long to realize that teaching is what I love. It's just awesome, this is what I want to be doing everyday without question.

PD: Do you enjoy having your own classroom this year?

BP: Ah, yes, the Pinabell Suite! It's great, last year I had to travel between five different rooms and it could sometimes be chaotic and very difficult. I like being able to be all set and ready to start class right at the bell. I love it, it's a place to call home and I'm really appreciative towards the school for this opportunity.

PD: Do you feel that your teaching style has changed at all since arriving to MC?

PD: What about the baseball team, where do you see it trending in the future?

We have a great group of seniors who are ready to take on the challenge, and there's also a phenomenal group of rising juniors. We obviously have tons of potential. We also happen to have the best statistician in the entire Catholic Conference. We have great pitching, we have outstanding defense, and we have guys who can hit really well. I think we have the potential to compete and win a lot of games.

PD: Is there anything you feel you could've improved on from last year?

BP: Well I think that as human beings, we are always improving and we never stop learning. There's always room for improvement no matter what, but life is a process and sometimes you need to see how things pan out. I could be more efficient from a personal standpoint, like finding a better balance between the field, the classroom, and home. Balance is key.

Cross country:

The cross country team had a successful season this fall, with meets against St. John's Prep, Xaverian, BC High, Catholic Memorial, and Braintree High. Although the team did not place first in any event, they still had some outstanding times. Senior captains Nick Leone, Colin Harvey, and Michael Cahill all placed in the top 5 runners and their best times were under twenty minutes, which are excellent times on the 5 kilometer run (3.1 mile). Not only did the seniors shine in their performances, as freshmen Jonah Carlson performed well throughout the year. Jonah won two of the dual meets, one against Marshfield and the other versus St John's Prep. He also medaled at the Ocean State Invitational. Jonah has a brother on the team, Noah Carlson ('18), who ran well all season. Coaches Kearney and Fitzgerald are looking forward to what's ahead for the young team.



Football:

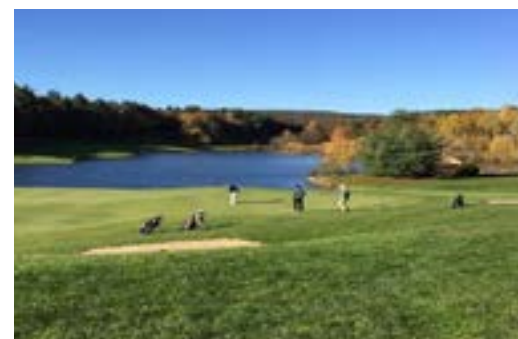
The Lancers played extremely well this season, significantly improving their record. The team had many big wins against tough opponents, such as Winchester, Malden, Catholic Memorial, and Newton South. MC had an explosive offense this season, led by quarterback Colin Sullivan ('17) and running backs Reise Turransky ('16) and Kellen Field ('17). When talking to Kyle Chute ('17) about the offense, he said, "We have a great line and skill that connect well when we execute plays." On the defensive side, MC's powerful defense stopped opposing offenses each week, holding a powerful BC High team to 17 points. The defense was led by captain Tom Sullivan ('16), Liam Smith ('17), and the whole D-line, which includes John Fionda ('17), James Irving ('16), Anthony Scarpa ('16) and Terence McGaughey ('19). The defense made extreme improvements, leading to a more successful season. The team qualified for the MIAA tournament, but suffered a tough loss in a first round game at Reading. Hopefully, the Lancers can carry their success into next season.

Golf:

Mr. O'Connor and the golf team had a great season on the course this year. Tim Donnelly ('16), Brendan Lavelle ('16), Brian Cannata ('18), and Lucas Dascoli ('19) were consistently in the top 5 spots, leading the team towards the playoffs. The team shot their best overall score at Mount Hood, scoring 268 in a win against the Winthrop team. Led by captain Tim Donnelly, the team qualified for the D2 State Tournament, held Monday, October 26. The team placed eighth in the tournament. Congratulations to the team on a successful season.

Soccer:

The soccer team topped their record from the past two seasons by ending 8-9-1 overall, and 8-4 in D2. The soccer team made the division two tournament after beating Woburn twice in a row. Captains Cam Kelly ('17) and Giuseppe Limoli ('16) are two of the three leading goalscorers. The official Golden boot was Devin Kelly ('16) with 18 goals and 7 assists, while being named the Eastern Conference All-Star. Quinn Reynolds ('17) has done a wonderful job with keeping possession in the middle while Liam Lynch-Galvin ('16) and Brendan McCarthy ('16) control the left and right sides of the midfield. The defense has been standing out all well with Dante egizi ('17) Connor Bond ('18), Brett Thomas ('18), Vinny Swierk ('18), and keeper Joe Toomey ('16). Striker Devin Kelly ('16) managed to put up 2 goals in a catholic conference win against Catholic Memorial on Wednesday October 7th. Best of luck to coach Schneider and coach Gill and the Lancers as they battle through their last regular season games. Senior Devin Kelly, the Golden Boot, has been the team's most effective offensive threat this season. With 19 goals and 10 assists, Devin is the largest single season point holder in the past four years, and the Catholic Conference's leading scorer.
