The Editor's Desk: Luther, Reformation and Social Media

This month's Key focuses on the theme of reformation, that process of improving something or someone, to make it new and at the same time clarify the essential heart of the thing that was there all along. Here at Faith, reformation happens on the individual level, through study of the scripture, worship, and fellowship; and at the institutional level, through congregational reflection on where the church has been and where it's going into the future. Through the Holy Spirit, God re-forms us every day, calling us to live out our faith in service to our neighbors, not only as individuals, but as the body of Christ at Faith Lutheran Church. It's why our young people make their public affirmation of faith on Reformation Sunday; in the same way that Luther's reformation began by articulating his faith, so do youth embark on the next stage of their lives in Christ with a statement of belief.

By all accounts, his own included, Martin Luther was a tortured soul. He reflected almost continually on his own sin, and felt that he could never measure up to God's expectations. Through study of the Psalms and the New Testament, he came to understand that salvation is a gift of God's grace, attainable through faith in Jesus as the Messiah.

Faith, for Luther, was a gift from God; the discovery of justification by faith was "as though I had been born again."

Freed from fear of divine condemnation, he was able to follow the example of Christ's saving actions and willingly serve God and his neighbors.

Luther's main worry? That his gullible neighbors were doomed to the fiery pits of Hell because they didn't know about Jesus Christ and had been tricked into believing that that their salvation could be purchased through indulgences. Luther's revelation moved him to write the *Disputation of Martin Luther on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences*, also known as the *95 Theses*, statements which were viewed as heretical by the church.

Friends translated the theses into German and printed and widely copied them, making the controversy one of the first in history to be aided by the printing press. Within two months, they had spread throughout Europe. Students thronged to Wittenburg to hear Luther speak. In effect, what had started out as a desire to improve the church and share the good news of justification by faith became a movement for change spurred on by the social media of Luther's time.

On the cover, we playfully imagined what Luther's Facebook page would have looked like. One can imagine a wide network of digitally connected friends and colleagues, all using the digital space to talk about and debate Luther's theology. In our inter-connected world, our personal experiences of God's grace and love have the power to touch other people, and our every action can have a positive impact. How might you respond to the grace you have been given and share God's grace with others? Whom have you been freed in Christ to serve?

We pray that you find in Faith a place for daily reformation, and that your service to others begins here.


Celebrate Confirmation!



Mission of the Month: Offender Aid and Restoration

What is OAR? Offender Aid and Restoration is a community-based non-profit serving Arlington and the Cities of Alexandria and Falls Church, OAR was started by five churches back in 1974. For 41 years, staff and volunteers have helped tens of thousands of men and women coming home from incarceration. OAR also manages the Community Service function for the Arlington and Falls Church courts by placing clients in volunteer positions with faith communities, nonprofits and

government agencies. And, staff train and supervise volunteers to teach in the Arlington jail and mentor folks coming out of both the Arlington and Alexandria jails. OAR was able to serve 2,813 clients in FY15.

OAR is here for you. You are encouraged to call upon OAR for any help you need in reference to folks you know and serve who either have been in prison or have loved ones in prison. They have qualified staff to talk with you about strategies for helping individuals and families. Call anytime! (Call Elizabeth Jones, Acting Executive Director 703-

Donate a Toy. There is a saying that when someone goes to prison, the family goes too. Each year OAR provides Christmas toys for children whose parents are incarcerated in the Arlington jail or who have just recently been released. We will again collect toys in October (see below). Last year just over 300 children received three toys each. We have our annual Project Christmas Angel wrapping party the middle of December each year where about 175 community members wrap all the toys. October 4 begins Faith's "Christmas in October" annual toy collection for Offender Aid and Restoration (OAR). Based on actual suggestions from their mothers and fathers, children will receive special Christmas gifts that send a message of love and connection from absent parents.

The process is easy: Choose one or more of the tags from the OAR tree in the Parish Hall, have fun shopping before the Christmas rush, and return your unwrapped donation to the large OAR box. Gift cards for older children are especially needed. Collection will continue throughout the month of October.

Last year Faith donated approximately 45 gifts, everything from dolls and trucks to art kits, gift cards, and sports equipment. Imagine the delight when children receive a package with a card signed by their absent parent, thanks to this OAR program and your generosity.

OAR: Mary's Story of Reformation

Mary came to OAR almost two years ago, having spent 8 years in prison where she earned many certificates in horticulture. We all assumed that landscaping companies would hire her, given her training and expertise. But none would, once they found out she had a criminal record.

She spoke one evening at an OAR function at Cherrydale Baptist Church and soon after, one of the men in the audience said he would hire her to do his lawn. With that start, Mary began a small business. OAR helped her get her business license, website and business cards. She initially operated her businesses on a scooter and finally the judge gave her a provisional license so she could get a van.

A year later she was able to hire other OAR clients and today runs a very busy small business, thanks to lots of good referrals.

Welcoming the Stranger

Last month several people volunteered during Faith's congregational service project aimed at helping refugees and immigrants in our community.

On "God's work, Our hands Sunday" several kids and adults assembled fifteen "welcome kits" for refugee families. Two of these bags, filled with shampoo, toothpaste, soap and other essential items have already been given to refugee families in northern Virginia on their first day in the United States. Imagine being picked up at the airport in a new country and taken to a strange apartment with only the clothes you brought with you! We hope these bags of toiletries will welcome them to their new home. The rest of the bags will be distributed to families arriving from Rwanda, Somalia and Afghanistan. The first wave of Syrian refugees are expected to start arriving in October.

Other volunteers also lent a hand at the Just Neighbors immigration clinic, helping immigrants from Egypt, Ethiopia, El Salvador,

Bolivia, China, Mexico and Bangladesh. Volunteers helped clients fill out applications and apply for immigration benefits for which there are eligible.

Faith was delighted to work with <u>Lutheran Social Services of the National Capital Area</u> and <u>Just Neighbors Ministry</u>. Thank you to everyone volunteered and brought in items for the welcome kits!
