Diana L. Eck is Professor of Comparative Religion and Indian Studies at Harvard University. She received her B.A. from Smith College, her M.A. from the School of Oriental and African Studies in London, and her Ph.D. from Harvard University. Her books on India include Banaras, City of Light; Darsan: Seeing the Divine Image in India; and India: A Sacred Geography. As founder and director of The Pluralism Project, she turned her attention closer to home to produce On Common Ground: World Religions in America, an extensive web-based resource on Buddhist, Hindu, Jain, Muslim, Sikh and Zoroastrian communities in America. She is also the author of A New Religious America: How A 'Christian' Country Has Become the World's Most Religiously Diverse Nation. In 1998, she received the National Humanities Medal from President Clinton for her work on religious pluralism in America.

The Ganga and the seven sacred rivers have long been invoked as the "mother rivers" bringing nourishment to the land and to the people of India. Why are the great rivers so important to the cultures and traditions of India? How are they faring today? What challenges do the sacred rivers face in a world driven by the demands of urbanization and industry? These are some of the issues she will address in her lecture.
