
#### MISSION FOCUS



Both groups focused on the same mission, Water is Basic (waterisbasic.org), a borehole drilling organization whose aim is to put clean, safe water within reasonable access for every person in South Sudan. As part of the experience, Carrie connected stories she shared about her friends in South Sudan with the day's Bible stories.

Through lemonade stands, extra chores, and even their tooth fairy money, the children collected over \$1,044 for the organization. With \$3.65 providing water for one child, that's water for 286 children!


The upper elementary kids also packed lunches for Greater Birmingham Ministries while others packed

# COMMUNION Brought To You

Let us share the consecrated elements of Holy Communion with you at your home, at the hospital, or at an extended care facility.

ou probably know that communion is served in both Traditonal and Contemporary Worship Services on the first Sunday of each month and every week during the New Traditions Service. But did you know that, thanks to a dedicated group of lay volunteers, it's available to be served to you anywhere, any day of the week?

"Holy Communion is an important part of the spirituality you get on Sundays, and if you're unable to make it to church because of a health or age issue, we're willing to bring Jesus to you," says the ministry's lay chair Joan Lauterbach.

Previously known as "At-Home Communion", this heartfelt ministry is expanding to reach all members and their loved ones when they aren't able to attend Canterbury due to a short-term stint in the hospital, recovery at a extended care or rehabilitation facility, being temporarily or long-term home-bound, or residing in a senior living center.

"In our Faith Community as United Methodists, Holy Communion is an invitation to take part in the special meal symbolic of the meal Christ ate with his disciples the night before his crucifixion," says Minister of Congregational Care Sam Williamson. "But we also recall the other meals he shared in homes and on hillsides.

"It is an invitation for us to focus on the unconditional love that God has for each of us and becomes an occasion of grace as we remember the holiness of our communion with God and one another. This is true whether we receive communion within the walls of the church or someone's home, extended care facility, or hospital room."

"Then he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

And he did the same with the cup after supper, saying, "This cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood."

— Luke 22: 19-10 (NRSV)

"My favorite day of the liturgical year is Maundy Thursday when Jesus took the bread, broke it, and said 'Eat, this is my body which is given for you.' And then he took the wine and said 'This is the new covenant in my blood,'" says Joan. "He gave us a part of himself, and whenever I receive Holy Communion, I feel that strength. It's my desire to share that strength with others."



Members of the group make regular visits to Brookdale Place on the first Sunday afternoon of the month, but are available to come to most locations anytime throughout the week. It can be on a one-time basis or as regular as you wish.

During the visit, consecrated elements are shared as part of a short service of liturgy, but each member personalizes the experience with scripture, words from that Sunday's service, and prayer. Many visits also extend into a time of conversation and sharing. "The communion service is personal and meaningful," says Betty Gunn. "We together experience the Presence of God in sharing the elements. And, as we talk together before the service begins, we hear from each other about what is going on in each other's lives."

"I feel so blessed that we are taking Jesus to others," says Annella Waldrup. "Many we serve are alone and just love when we come and spend some time with them. I feel like it is the sweetest thing in the world that I can bring this to them. Being on the serving end, we build relationships which is very important, and I've been able to stay in touch with some of my contemporaries that aren't able to come to church regularly anymore."

Communion is not just a ritual; it puts us in communion with God so we can experience the joy and peace of his loving presence. We want to ensure that even those who cannot come to church can still be a part of our communion services. "Whatever the circumstances, we hope you will invite us to bring this sacrament to you or a loved one," says Sam.

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
