

Cashing In: Biofuels Industry Buys Congress's Continued Support



The biofuels industry has racked up a series of impressive political victories over its three decades of government support, including the continuation of significant federal tax breaks for corn ethanol, a tariff on imports and a federal mandate for its use. Now pressed to come up with more than a trillion dollars in budget savings over the next decade or face across-the-board budget cuts, Congress has finally considered ending some of these redundant and costly programs. Yet, despite the recent uprising of small government advocates, most noticeably the Tea Party movement, Congress has been unable to significantly reduce federal spending on biofuels subsidies or the federal mandates distorting our energy markets. Even now, during the feverish search for budget savings, ethanol interests are making a play for new biofuels subsidies for vehicles that run mostly on corn ethanol, along with increased government investment for new ethanol blender pumps.

Congress has been subsidizing ethanol for decades, costing taxpayers over \$30 billion since 2004.

A look at 89 businesses and organizations that are part of or lobby for the biofuels industry shows the considerable clout they are throwing around in Congress:

- **Lobbying:** The biofuels industry spent almost \$31 million on lobbying so far in 2011 – or roughly \$169,000 per day – capping off a total of nearly \$243 million in lobbying expenditures from 2008-2011. It employs hundreds of lobbyists, including former Congressional and administration staff, and even a few former members of Congress themselves.
- **Contributions:** Over the last three election cycles, the biofuels industry has donated more than \$12.5 million in campaign contributions to the members of the 112th Congress.
- **Super Committee:** Members of the so-called Super Committee have received \$708,000 from this industry over the same period.

In anticipation of the loss of the lucrative ethanol tax credit, the biofuels industry is fighting for continued government spending on biofuels research, federally backed loan guarantees for construction projects, special tax provisions meant to encourage biofuels production, and even federal outlays for building a biofuels infrastructure, such as installation of ethanol-compatible blender pumps at gas stations. After the Senate overwhelmingly voted to revoke the largest ethanol subsidy—the Volumetric Ethanol Excise Tax Credit (VEETC), which gives ethanol blenders \$0.45 for every gallon of ethanol they blend with gasoline —earlier this year, biofuels lobbyists have given up on another renewal of this redundant tax cut, and shifted their efforts to secure a new subsidy for E85, a fuel comprised of 15 percent gasoline and 85 percent ethanol. Biofuels lobbyists are looking for a new subsidy for biofuels production just as the Super Committee

struggles to find at least \$1.2 trillion in savings in the budget. The industry now wants E85 considered an alternative fuel so it will qualify for the Alternative Fuel Credit (AFC), but current law *specifically prohibits* ethanol from qualifying for the AFC.

Farm state lawmakers and Congressional leadership are some of the biggest recipients of contributions from the biofuels industry. Without the subsidies to transform corn, soy, switchgrass, and other organic materials into ethanol and other biofuels, demand for those crops would fall and prices would lower accordingly. The most common biofuel in use today—corn ethanol—is subsidized through a number of federal policies in the name of clean energy, the most significant of which are the VEETC, which subsidizes ethanol production to the tune of \$6 billion a year, and the Renewable Fuels Standard (RFS), which mandates the use of billions of gallons of biofuels every year.

Congress has failed to cut back on the federal programs propping up the biofuels industry, particularly the corn ethanol industry, despite fundamental questions about their effectiveness, economically, fiscally, and environmentally:

- Economically:** The Congressional Budget Office estimated that taxpayer subsidies for ethanol were responsible for a 20 percent increase in the price of corn in 2008, a year in which consumers saw a drastic rise in price per bushel from \$3.39 to \$5.14. The effect of increased corn prices is an increase in the price of meat, since corn is often used as animal feed, and a domino effect increase in the price of other crops like soybeans since

more acreage is shifted to corn production. The Department of Agriculture reported nearly a doubling of feed prices between 2006-2008, due in part to rising corn use.

- Fiscally:** “The ethanol tax credit and the Renewable Fuel Standard can be duplicative in stimulating domestic production and use of ethanol, and can result in substantial loss of revenue to the Treasury,” reported the Government Accountability Office in March 2011. If current law is extended, taxpayers could subsidize ethanol production through both direct (tax credits) and indirect (market price support) subsidies worth approximately \$56 billion from 2011 to 2015.
- Environmentally:** “The Renewable Fuel Standard may be an ineffective policy for reducing global greenhouse gas emissions,” said Ingrid Burke, co-chair of the National Research Council, which just released a congressionally-requested report studying the issue titled, “Renewable Fuel Standard: Potential Economic and Environmental Effects of U.S. Biofuel Policy.” The report found that the high expense and difficulty in producing next-generation biofuels is likely to increase federal spending in order to meet RFS production goals and that indirect land use changes due to expanded biofuels production may nullify any environmental benefit from burning ethanol instead of gasoline. Additionally, the vast majority of subsidies for biofuels are gobbled up by the environmentally damaging corn ethanol.

The biggest recipients of these taxpayer subsidies aren't “mom and pop” companies struggling to survive. Shell Oil's website boasts that the company has been “distributing biofuels for more than thirty years” and they are a blender of ethanol and gasoline, meaning they receive money directly from the VEETC. If the VEETC expires, Shell will lose money, perhaps forcing them to use a tiny portion of their \$18.6 billion in profits from 2010 to offset their lost government subsidy. Shell's first quarter lobbying report from 2009 even lists former Sen. John Breaux, a member of Congress for 33 years, lobbying for Shell Oil on “Energy Tax Credits.” And National Journal estimated that BP, the company responsible for the major oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico last year, earned \$600 million from the VEETC in 2010 alone. While not all of the lobbying money spent by major oil companies like Chevron, Shell, and Marathon is used promoting biofuels subsidies, these companies are included in our list because they are some of the primary beneficiaries of these policies and because they wield immense amounts of clout on Capitol Hill—as is demonstrated by the amount they donate to Congress and spend on lobbying—ensuring the continuation of these

wasteful policies.

The ethanol industry gets help in many ways: the government subsidizes its production, mandates its use, and protects it from foreign competition. In recent years, the government has started to help build biofuel plants and install blender pumps. Poet LLC, one of the largest ethanol refiners in the country, just received a \$105 million loan guarantee from the Department of Energy to build a new cellulosic ethanol plant in Iowa, making taxpayers liable if the plant or its technology fails. The

Department of Agriculture is also helping finance 10,000 blender pumps and storage systems for biofuels over the next 5 years. Growth Energy, which benefits from having 16-year veteran of Congress and former director of the Office of Management and Budget Jim Nussle on its team, and other ethanol lobby groups are pushing a plan to transfer savings from the expiration of VEETC to help pay for even more biofuels infrastructure build out.

Seeing the success of the ethanol industry, new and emerging biofuels companies and their lobbyists are hoping for billions in annual government subsidies. On top of the industry's latest push for new subsidies for E85, other kinds

of biofuels already get or are looking for new subsidies:

- Biodiesel, diesel made most often from soybeans, animal fats, or recycled cooking oils, gets its own tax credit: \$1.00 for every gallon of biodiesel mixed with petroleum diesel.
- Cellulosic ethanol, made from switch grass, corn husks, and other non-edible organic materials, has a tax credit for \$1.01 per gallon blended with gasoline.
- Small producers of ethanol get an extra \$0.10 for the first 15 million gallons of ethanol they produce.
- Ethanol made from algae is on the hunt too, working a new subsidy into a bipartisan agreement in the Senate that had broad support but never got a vote.

Even in these challenging budgetary times, when all of Washington is focused on the country's growing fiscal problems, biofuels interests are looking for more taxpayer subsidies. Spending \$12.5 million on the campaigns of members of Congress before spending another \$243 million lobbying them once they're in office, this special interest is experiencing no dearth of access or funding. Taxpayers need Congress to say no to more subsidies for an industry that can stand on its own feet. Ethanol is thriving and can well afford funding the next generation biofuel without taxpayer help.
