Overview of Workshop: A Church Shift: Moving from Church Growth to Bearing Fruit

(The gathering with small churches/all churches interested)

TUESDAY NIGHT FEB 16, 2016 6:15 pm at St. Giles Presbyterian Church

Church growth is a good thing, but it should never be the end result of our ministry. Far too many churches have the burden placed on them that a healthy church is a large church. In Western culture "large" is often seen as better than "small." Therefore, the key to success for a church is to figure out how to become larger. We have put too much pressure on the local church, through the church growth model, to become something that many churches will never become. Some of our churches are not in contexts in which numerical growth is possible.

But every church can bear fruit. What if we start with Jesus' words in John 15:5? Jesus says, "I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." In this gathering, we will examine what it means to abide in Christ. What are the practices that help us abide (remain connected to the vine)? What does it mean to bear fruit? What will our churches and communities look like when people are going deeper in their faith and there is more love, peace, and joy to go around?

As we bear fruit, we share the faith with people without hope, we do justice, we practice hospitality, and we are agents of healing. In other words, we are the body of Christ. If the context permits, there will be numerical growth. But no matter the numbers, there will always be spiritual, emotional, and personal growth. When lives change communities change.
