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#### **Preparing for Reformation 500**

Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton at our synod assembly challenged congregations to study Luther's Small Catechism as we approach 2017. There are a variety of ways in which we can use these writings. Printing in the bulletin or by having people turn to the corresponding page in the back of the ELW, we can include a different portion of the Small Catechism with explanation in the worship service as part of the liturgy. For example using one article of the Apostle's Creed with explanation instead of the entire creed for three weeks in a row or the Lord's Prayer during Lent.

Connections: Faith and Life was written by Norma Cook Everist and Nelvin Vos to help adults connect the Small Catechism with today's world. Originally published in booklet format it is now a free download at <a href="https://www.wartburgseminary.edu/resources/connections-resource-congregations/">www.wartburgseminary.edu/resources/connections-resource-congregations/</a>

#### New Arrivals

**All Hands In!: (Drumming the Biblical Narrative)** is another way for teaching The Story. This is a great resource for a congregation with music leaders. Each of the ten stories includes a variety of activities to accommodate various ages, group sizes and abilities. Looking for a different approach to Christian Education or to transition to a new format? This curriculum is worth considering.

CoLaborate: is the new catechism curriculum from SparkHouse. The best way to learn more about this curriculum is to participate in a webinar found at <a href="https://www.augsburgfortress.org">www.augsburgfortress.org</a> (held weekly at varying times). Full samples can be borrowed from the resource center or single samples can be viewed at <a href="https://www.wearesparkhouse.org">www.wearesparkhouse.org</a>. Each unit has 15 sessions. The units currently available are Old Testament and Lutheran History & Catechism. The units New Testament and Lutheran Living will complete the series. The curriculum provides 2-6 minute video clips for each session which may be used but is not required. Some of the clips you may find appropriate to use in other settings such as new member classes or Bible study introductions.

### **Baptism**

With upcoming conversations about the connection between baptism and communion congregations may want to review the statement *The Use of the Means of Grace*, especially the portion on baptism. A downloadable copy is available at <a href="https://www.elca.org">www.elca.org</a> and it does include a study guide. Another resource to guide conversation *Table and Font: Who is Welcome to the Table* can also be downloaded from <a href="https://www.elca.org">www.elca.org</a>.



There are a variety of resources available to generate conversation regarding baptism:

*Go Make Disciples: An Invitation to Baptismal Living* contains "Water Life: A Bible study on Baptism and Water Images" that uses 16+ scripture passages. Host an art display on this theme to reinforce the learning.

**Baptism:** A **User's Guide** by Martin Marty contains a discussion guide in the back of the book for each of the nine chapters.

**Baptism:** God's Activity of Grace touches on the different aspects of baptism and also contains discussion questions in the back of the book for each of the five chapters.

**No Greater Jewel: Thinking about Baptism with Luther** by Kirsi Stjerna in brief chapters with discussion questions begins with "Why and How have Christians Baptized" and ends with "Considerations Today".

*Flowing Water Uncommon Birth: Christian Baptism in a Post-Christian Culture* by Samuel Torvend prompts the reader to consider how they are living out their baptism. Six chapters, five with discussion questions aid in group discussions.

*Washed and Welcome: A Baptism Sourcebook* provides suggestions for ways to remind individuals of their baptism and how to support one another in baptismal living.
