

Jeremiah Roy is 18 years old and just finished his first semester in College! He is a member of Groundwork New Orleans.



them. Growing up within the Chesapeake Bay watershed has also influenced her to attend graduate school to study freshwater ecology.




Julia Sosin is an environmental science grad from Metro Detroit, MI. She loves music, gardening, meeting other people, and bicycling.

Karen Reyes is a member of Groundwork Dallas.




Kevin Blanchette Jr is a life liver. The outdoors is his home. He loves challenging himself, and pushing his limits. He also loves hearing people's stories.


the Green Team. She now works as the Director of Youth Program at Groundwork Hudson Valley
