Exam Prep Tips: - Organize your notes for each class including any handouts, tests, etc.

- Make note cards and/or rewrite your notes.
- Do not try to cram the night before!!
- Get a good night's sleep.

- Take the exams seriously - they count as $20 \%$ of your semester grade. (see reverse)
- Bring \#2 pencils, pens and a calculator (if needed).
- Use the extra time on the half days to study!

Transportation:

Formula to determine $1^{\text {st }}$ semester grade: $\left(1^{\text {st }} \mathrm{QGr} * .40\right)+\left(2^{\text {nd }} \mathrm{QGr} * .40\right)+\left(1^{\text {st }}\right.$ SemExam $\left.* .20\right)$
Formula to determine $2^{\text {nd }}$ semester grade: $\left(3^{\text {rd }} \mathrm{QGr} * .40\right)+\left(4^{\text {th }} \mathrm{QGr} * .40\right)+\left(2^{\text {nd }}\right.$ SemExam $\left.* .20\right)$
Formula to determine Final grade for the course: $\left(1^{\text {st }} \mathrm{SemGr}+2^{\text {nd }} \mathrm{SemGr}\right) / 2$

## Examples of how your exams can affect your grades:

1. Student \#1 and Student \#2 earned the same grades for $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ quarters. Student \#1 thought that he was prepared for exams because his grades were very good, and he did not study. Student \#2 did not want to take any chances so he prepared diligently for his tests. Here are their grades:

|  |  | Student 1 | Student 2 |
| ---: | :---: | :---: | :---: |
| $1^{\text {st }}$ Quarter Grade: | $40 \%$ | 90 | 90 |
| $2^{\text {nd }}$ Quarter Grade: | $40 \%$ | 93 | 93 |
| Exam Grade: | $20 \%$ | 48 | 98 |
| $1^{\text {st }}$ Semester Grade: | $82.8(83)$ | $92.8(93)$ |  |

Student \#1 did not do well on his midterm exam, and his semester grade dropped significantly. On the other hand, Student \#2 was able to maintain the average for the semester.
2. Student \#3 and Student \#4 earned the same grades for $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ quarters. Student \#3 figured the exam wasn't going to make a difference, so he didn't study. Student \#4 was hoping that a good effort on his exams could only help, so he asked for help and studied for his exams. Here are their grades:

|  |  | Student 3 | Student 4 |
| ---: | :---: | :---: | :---: |
| $1^{\text {st }}$ Quarter Grade: | $40 \%$ | 76 | 76 |
| $2^{\text {nd }}$ Quarter Grade: | $40 \%$ | 80 | 80 |
| Exam Grade: | $20 \%$ | 53 | 86 |
| $1^{\text {st }}$ Semester Grade: | 73 | $79.6(80)$ |  |
