TASC FAQs (Frequently Asked Questions)

What is the TASC?	The TASC (Test assessing secondary completion) is the new High School Equivalency exam in New York State. It replaces the GED.	
Who can take the TASC?	You are eligible to take the TASC if you have lived in New York State for at least 30 days and are at least 19 years old . If you are 16-18 years old, eligibility rules and requirements can be found at http://www.acces.nysed.gov/hse/application-process-and-eligibility-requirements	
How much does TASC cost?	There is no charge to take the test in New York State.	
Can I use passing scores from the GED?	Yes, but only if you passed any section(s) of the GED between 2002 and 2013. Those scores will count as passing for the TASC. If you passed all five (5) GED sections but did not get a total score of at least 2250, you must pass at least one of the TASC sub-tests to obtain a New York State High School Equivalency Diploma. The first time you take the TASC, you must take the entire test.	
If I pass several parts of TASC, do I have to take the entire test again?	No, you only need to retake the subject tests you did not pass.	
How long does the test take?	The test lasts about 9 hours and is given over 2 days.	
What subjects are included?	There are five tests: 1)language arts - writing (including an essay, 2) language arts - reading, 3) science, 4) social studies and 5) math (2 parts - 1 with calculator). See the chart that follows the FAQs for types of questions and times allotted per test.	
How many times can you take the test in a year?	You can take the test up to 3 times in one year.	
In what languages is TASC given?	TASC is offered in English & Spanish.(It is also available in Braille, large print and audio versions.)	
What calculator is used for the test?	TI-30XS is the recommended calculator. For other recommended calculators go to http://www.tasctest.com/tasc-test-calculators-for-test-takers.html .	
Should I bring a calculator to the test?	No, calculators are provided at the testing site.

What is the passing score for each test?	The passing score for each TASC subject area is 500. On the writing test you must score at least 2 out of 8 points to pass. Students pass the TASC test overall when they have passed each of the 5 subject tests.
