#### **Session 1 Key Speakers:**

**Nora Stanger** grew up as a child of poverty in Lawrence County, Ohio, in the foothills of Appalachia, earning a Master of Science degree in clinical psychology from Abilene Christian University. Nora is a storyteller, offering her story. Her teachings will focus on the Appalachian culture, growing up poor, understanding the culture of poverty, and excelling through poverty. She authored "Diamonds in the Dew: An Appalachian Experience."

John Baney is the Vice-Chair of the United Methodist Appalachian Ministry Network, and chair of the Hunger & Poverty teams. He will share what the UMANM does, the grant application process & criteria for a successful application. He will highlight some of the ministries that they have supported as examples of the kind and type of ministries that have been successful in other parts of Appalachia. He will offer a short training module about ministry with the poor.

**Dr. Michael Linger** is the Executive Director of the *House of the Carpenter*, a Christ centered organization affiliated with the WV Conference, UMC. The *HOC* has three vital parts of its mission: Ministries of Mercy: Helping provide the basic needs that people have; Ministries of Justice: Assisting people in developing skills and understandings that make it easier for them to improve their quality of life; Ministry of Spiritual Formation: Introducing and helping disciple people through faith in Jesus Christ.

**Keith Wasserman** is now in his 35th year with Good Works, with the vision to create and sustain a COM-MUNITY OF HOPE with and for people who are struggling with poverty and homelessness in rural Appalachia Ohio. They offer people in need biblical hospitality, assistance, and a way to share their gifts/abilities with others. *Transformation Station* gives people needed resources, while volunteering in meaningful ways to help other people in the Athens County.
