



<b>PROPOSITION 30</b>	
<b>VOTE YES</b>	
<b>Schools and Local Public Safety Protection Act</b>	
A temporary sales and personal income tax increase measure with provisions to direct new revenue into public education.	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Prevent billions in school cuts from K-12, colleges and universities</li> <li>• Increases income taxes on top 3% of Californians</li> <li>• Increase sales tax rate by ¼ penny</li> <li>• Money would be used for education and public safety</li> <li>• Begins to restore fiscal stability and close the budget gap</li> </ul>	

<b>PROPOSITION 32</b>	
<b>VOTE NO</b>	
<b>Special Exemptions Act</b>	
Deceptive corporate initiative that pretends to be “campaign finance reform” but is truly Citizens United on steroids. Would increase the power of corporations and super PACs and eliminate the voices of working people in California politics.	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Intentionally written to create special exemptions for big businesses and Super PACs, allowing them to spend unlimited amounts of secret money to influence CA elections</li> <li>• Prop 32 will restrict and silence the voices of teachers, students, parents, administrators, and many organizations that advocate on behalf of our public school students, public education professionals and public workers</li> </ul>	

<b>PROPOSITION 34</b>	
<b>VOTE YES</b>	
<b>Repeal Death Penalty/ SAFE California Act</b>	
Replaces the death penalty as maximum punishment for persons found guilty of murder with life imprisonment without possibility of parole. Applies retroactively to persons already sentenced to death. Also requires convicted killers to work while in prison, directs their earnings to their victims, and earmarks \$100 million for police to solve murders and rapes.	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Guarantees we never execute an innocent person by replacing California’s broken death penalty with life in prison without possibility of parole.</li> <li>• Saves \$130 million tax dollars each year</li> </ul>	

## LONG BEACH VOTER GUIDE

<b>PROPOSITION 36</b>	
<b>VOTE YES</b>	
<b>3 Strikes Reform Act</b>	
Revises the 3 strike law to impose life sentence only when the new felony conviction is “serious or violent.” Authorizes re-sentencing for offenders currently serving life sentences.	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Restores the original intent of the Three Strikes law by focusing on convicted violent criminals.</li> <li>• Saves over \$100,000,000 annually</li> </ul>	

<b>MEASURE N</b>	
<b>VOTE YES</b>	
<b>Living Wage for Hotel Workers</b>	
This measure will establish a minimum wage and minimum sick days for Long Beach Hotel Workers	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Only require hotels with more than 100 rooms to pay workers a minimum of \$13 per hour</li> <li>• Protect workers tips by ensuring that service charges are paid entirely to the hotel worker performing services of the costumers from whom the service charges are collected.</li> <li>• Allow hotel workers to use up to five paid days off per year for sick leave, vacation, or personal necessity.</li> </ul>	

<b>MEASURE O</b>	
<b>VOTE YES</b>	
<b>Change Dates of the Primary &amp; General Elections</b>	
This measure will consolidate the number of elections from 3 to 2 and increase voter turnout in the local election	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Districts will have to pay the full cost of the April elections. According to the City Clerk, this is approximately \$800,000.</li> <li>• There will be millions of dollars in savings to the city once the County has the capacity to consolidate multiple elections.</li> <li>• The city should encourage voter participation in any manner possible – especially when it is cost neutral or even saves the city money to do so.</li> </ul>
