

Atomic: "I may be tiny, but I've got a giant purr!"

For kittens like Atomic, their survival is literally in our hands. Atomic weighed just ounces when she was brought to SHS. Found in a local backyard, the tiny orange kitten appeared to be newborn with her eyes not yet open, all alone with no apparent means of survival.

She had an abscess on her neck and her fur was in terrible condition. Our veterinarian immediately attended to her wound, administered antibiotics and kept her warm and well-fed. Under the attentive care of our medical team and Ashley, our Foster Program Manager, Atomic has become healthier, extremely playful and is eating (and purring!) like a champ, yet has remained very small. At 5 weeks old, she was the size of a two week old kitten. Now at 11 weeks old she has started to put on weight, but is


still not growing at a normal rate. Diagnostic testing has not given our veterinarian enough concrete information to act on.

As Atomic continues to grow and mature in the coming days, we anticipate getting a clearer picture of

what could be causing her slow growth rate. In the meantime, we will surround this tiny being with all the love and medical attention she needs.

Each year during kitten season, we help about 500 kittens go from homeless and helpless to strong and healthy. This is no easy feat considering that most, even without challenges like Atomic's, arrive in a very fragile state. They are hungry, dirty, covered with fleas and frequently have compromised health. Our shelter hospital team routinely treats kittens for colds, tummy parasites, digestive upsets, eye infections and anemia due to flea infestation during the season.
