Our Lenten Journey Begins February 10

While it may seem that we've only just packed our Christmas things away, the season of Lent will begin next week. Broadway is preparing and planning for this time of reflection with special worship services, Lenten devotionals, and powerful and moving Holy Week worship.

Lenten Devotional

Rev. Sarah Griffith Lund, the daughter of members Jennie Griffith and grand-daughter of Beulah Wilson, grew up at Broadway. Sarah went on to attend the Princeton School of Divinity and was ordained as a minister in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) at Broadway. Sarah is the author of Fellowship of Prayer 2016, a devotional guide that frames the journey of Christ in his final weeks on earth, with the cyclical shifts of nature. Ash Wednesday, February 10

Broadway's commemoration of Ash Wednesday will be held at 5:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary. Worship will include the imposition of ashes. Following worship, everyone is invited to share in a communal meal in the Fellowship Hall. The meal will be prepared by Broadway's Service Ministry team, and all proceeds will defray expenses for the upcoming El Salvador mission trip. A donation of \$5 is suggested.



Lenten Vespers

Each Wednesday evening during Lent, a Vespers worship will lead us into Holy Week. The service will be held in the Fellowship Hall, and will end with communion and an optional shared meal. The first Vespers worship will be held on February 17, and all services begin at 5:30 p.m.



Wednesday evening Meditative Prayer and Taize

Following each Wednesday's Vespers service, the Sanctuary will be open at 6:30 p.m. for meditative prayer and silence. Following this quiet time of reflection, Taize worship will begin at 7:00 p.m. (Please note: there will be no meditative prayer or Taize on March 9). Taize worship will conclude at 7:30 p.m.

I once attended a spiritual retreat in which they shrank our times of meeting, eating and sleeping into smaller units. For example, a day was divided into three six-hour units rather than three eight-hour units. We compressed much more living into a smaller overall time frame. Only later did I discover that submariners do that routinely as they rotate bunks and berths for sleeping in longruns without surfacing.



beginning Lent, a forty-day period imbued with special significance. We are in a “season” and that season takes on a special tenor and tone that we share collectively.

Is it real? If by that question do you mean to ask “is it natural?” the answer would be no, it’s not. It is artificial. We have rearranged time, designated time, set apart time to rehearse and rerun truths that we believe are

Time is ordinarily determined by the natural cycles of light and dark. We can, however, artificially modify time. Not only can we modify the lengths of time and rearrange what would be day and night, we can assign particular meaning to certain portions of time. That’s what religious communities do all the time. In the church, for instance, we set aside certain times of the year and designate them “story time,” a time that is informed by the meanings of a story.

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of one of those story times for those of us in the church. We say we are

essential and life-giving. That is what the season of Lent is, that journey in which we rehearse the story of Jesus making his way to Jerusalem and the cross. We will even set aside another time within that time, a week we call holy week, to draw together all the stories that shape what we believe about God, Jesus, the meaning of history and our lives.

We walk these time-altered stories over and over in the hopes that they will sink in and transform us and our communities. Hour by repetitive hour they do, and if not this year then the next.

A Trio of Opportunities for Mission Near and Far

When folks talk about going on a “mission trip,” there is an automatic assumption that the trip will involve a plane and a passport. Sometimes that is the case, sometimes not. Below you will find three distinct and different mission opportunities—and only one of them involves getting a passport!

A Four-Day Habitat for Humanity Sale Immersion

You may not think of Broadway's **Habitat Sale** as a mission opportunity, but it is! Our Sale is on April 9, but set-up of the CLC and Fellowship Hall will begin Wednesday, April 6 and continue with Friday, April 8. For many Habitat volunteers, it is a 12-to-14 hour day, which sounds a lot like a mission trip. Volunteers are fed meals throughout each day of Sale prep, again sounding like a mission trip. And there is definitely a sense of accomplishment on Sale Day around 5:00 p.m., when everything is ready for church on Sunday—and we have raised close to \$20,000 for Habitat!

Consider using two or three vacation days to do local mission at Broadway's Habitat Sale. Our local Habitat chapter has built over 100 homes since it began, and Broadway's support through the annual Habitat Sale has been a big part of their success. Mission trip projects often involve a construction project—by helping at the Habitat Sale, you're building here!

El Salvador Mission, May 28-June 3

Broadway's relationship with the people of El Salvador is in its sixth year, and each time a group returns from this beautiful and struggling country, the sentiment is always the same. Those of us who have made the trip receive far more from the experience than we are able to give.

Our mission team will travel to El Salvador on Saturday, May 28. The team will be housed in a hotel

in the capital city of San Salvador for the duration of the trip. On Sunday, the Broadway team will visit a rural church to share worship and a meal together. Hands-on work will begin the following day.

Deepen your Spirituality -

Extend Your Mission

During the past year, many have been reading the works of Thomas Merton, well-known monastic and spiritual master, as 2015 was the centenary of his birth. As a way to cap off our Merton year, we are planning a pilgrimage/retreat to the Gethsemane Monastery in Kentucky, the house where Merton lived and wrote as a monk. The dates of the pilgrimage, including days of travel will be Monday-Thursday, June 6-9, 2016. We will caravan with cars, passing through Louisville and visiting the Merton Center on the way. Accommodations in the guest house are available for both singles and couples.

The Trappist order maintains silence as a spiritual discipline. The entire community gathers for the hours of prayer several times a day. We will take our meals with other retreatants in the common dining room and one of the monks will give a talk on the spiritual life each afternoon. The accent is on prayer, meditation, spiritual reading, and walks through the extensive grounds. The cost of the pilgrimage will include contributing to the transportation and a daily contribution to the monastery for food and lodging.

Service Ministry Dedicates Funds to Patriot Place

Joining A Partnership to Provide Homes for Homeless Veterans

During the 20/20 Vision process, each of Broadway's ministry areas was asked to fine-tune their ministries, to take time to identify and list ministry objectives for the next decade. As a part of this project, Broadway's Service/Mission and Outreach Ministry (MOM) prioritized its ministry goals. At the top of the list were ministries to provide food and shelter.

With careful stewardship, MOM has been able to plan for the day when a large, identified need would arise—and we would be in a position to help. This "big project fund" has grown with the help of many, many Broadway members and our congregation's continuing support of a tithe from the church operating budget to outreach ministries.

Recently, an email from Columbia Housing Authority Executive Director Phil Steinhaus was sent to everyone who is interested in low-income housing in Boone County. The first phase of the cooperative project to house homeless veterans, Patriot Place, was nearing



completion—but there was a bit of a problem. Each of the 25 one-bedroom apartments was almost ready for occupancy, but funding was available to furnish only 10 of the units. Phil explained that to completely furnish and equip each apartment would cost \$4,000. This would supply everything from a mattress to pots and pans for the kitchen.

At its January 25 meeting, the members of MOM approved the disbursement of \$4,000 to furnish and equip one apartment. This decision is in keeping with MOM's ministry objectives, and dovetails with Broadway's active and growing ministry to veterans.

So, thank you, Broadway, for your commitment to outreach ministry. From our budget tithe, to the Community Garden, Habitat, and Room at the Inn, it is clear for all to see that there is a heart for service here.

Garden Coalition Getting Ready for Spring

It is not quite time to break ground in the garden, but the Columbia Garden Coalition has broken out the seed catalogs!

On February 17 from 6:00-8:00 p.m., there will be a "seed packing" night at Centro Latino, 609 N. Garth (across from Oak Tower). A meal will be provided for all who attend and help package bulk seeds for the Spring Thaw event.

The 2016 Spring Thaw will take place on Saturday, February 20, at the ARC on Ash Street. All gardeners can pick up their seed and some gardening tips, too!

Room at the Inn Moves To Downtown Churches

On January 31, Room at the Inn transitioned from Broadway to Missouri United Methodist Church in downtown Columbia. The shelter will be housed at MUMC until February 14, when it will move to First Presbyterian's third-floor gym space. On February 21, the shelter will move for the final time during the 2016 season to First Baptist Church.

Broadway members, members from other Columbia churches, students and the public donated hundreds of hours to the shelter during its four weeks at Broadway. Thanks to each of you, the shelter operated at near capacity each night. It was truly a warm and safe place to sleep!

Chili Cook-Off Was First Fellowship of 2016

Broadway's 7th annual Chili Cook-Off kicked off Connections Ministry's first fellowship event of the year with a hint of cayenne pepper and jalapenos! Fourteen chili chefs entered the friendly competition, and (surprise, surprise!) the Boys' Small Group took top honors and took the coveted Golden Ladle to the trophy case!

General Minister Search Committee Selected

Progress: In this first communication, we are pleased to inform you that the General Minister and President (GMP) Search Committee of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) has been approved by the General Board. With a sense of humbleness and gratitude for being called to this important task, the committee met from Jan. 15-17 in Dallas, Texas to begin the search process.

During this two-day meeting, we prayed with each other for God's guidance, participated in Pro-Reconciliation/ Anti-Racism training, spent time building covenant with each other, and focused our energies in active listening and engagement. We established a timeline that will take us from writing the position description through interviews and final recommendation of our denomination's spiritual leader and Chief Executive Officer.

Communication: It is important that we engage everyone in the church. Everyone - from the folks in the pews through the General Church. With this communication, we invite you to walk this journey with us. We have established a GMP Search Committee informational page which will serve as a way for you to communicate your thoughts and ideas with us. A questionnaire will be provided to solicit your input and we will be sending updates throughout our process. Disciples Council Seeks Unity in the Christian Church

Robert Walsh is retiring after 16 years of service as the President of the Disciples of Christ Council on Christian Unity. He offers the following 10 “basic understandings” to illustrate the vision of today’s ecumenical movement within the Disciples of Christ and in the larger world.



and tradition, and being open to receive the best from other denominations and traditions in their histories, theologies, understandings of faith,

worship styles and spiritualities.

1. As the starting point, **our unity is in Jesus Christ**, not in structures or instruments or theological agreement, but in the grace and love of God offered to us and to the world in Jesus Christ.

2. Thus, **unity is God’s gift**. It is not something we vote into being. We never vote on the unity of the church, but receive the gift of unity and oneness from God as we enter into new relations in mission and ministry, service and witness.

3. As Disciples of Christ, **unity begins at the Lord’s Table** where we are made one in Christ; and from the Table, **we are called** to witness to the message of reconciliation, welcome and hospitality that we have experienced in our being welcomed.

4. **Unity is being lived out at home**—that is, unity exists in congregational life and in seeing our congregations today as ecumenical communities of faith.

5. **Unity is more relational than institutional**. Christian unity finds its life and reality in relationships as we worship together, serve together, and engage in mission together. Today, we are not working on “plans of union” or statements of theological consensus; but rather, we make commitments to engage in deepening relationships with other Christians and churches in worship, confessing our faith, and addressing issues of social justice and peace together.

6. The task of Christian unity is really about **the task of sharing gifts**: of learning to give and to receive, in offering the best of our Disciples heritage

7. **Unity does not mean uniformity** in belief or practice: it is not based upon our agreement as Christians, but upon our shared life in the Risen Christ. We are seeking oneness in Christ, not sameness in our theologies or worship or practices.

8. Thus, unity will be lived out with **a great deal of diversity**. The challenge is to embrace an understanding of church that is bigger and wider, richer and older than we are today as Disciples of Christ. Unity is not about a loss of our identity as Disciples, but the claiming of a larger identity in Christ.

9. **The challenge of Christian unity** in our world today is also **a call to interfaith engagement and dialogue**: learning ways to encounter people of other faiths in order to live in community with them; to learn from them, develop mutual respect, and discover areas of commonality; and, to witness to God’s love for all peoples in breaking down barriers between persons and nations in the pursuit of peace.

10. **The unity we seek** in being reconciled to another as individuals and as churches **is finally personal, not simply institutional**. That is, all exclusion, prejudice and division based upon race, gender, nationality, theology or belief are not simply issues to be addressed or programs to be undertaken, but are experienced personally by individuals—both within the church and in society.
