# Pentecost and Baptism: Acting on Faith

On Pentecost, Jesus charged his disciples to act in his stead, to show their faith to a skeptical world, to be the hands, feet and heart of Jesus as they traveled through uncertain times.

On Sunday, May 15, we will celebrate Pentecost, along with the baptism of 11 young people and one adult. Our baptism candidates have been formally preparing for this day since Ash Wednesday, with weekly meetings with our ministers, spending time with baptism mentors and preparing for Pentecost.

In addition to the weeks of preparation with our ministers and mentors, the baptism candidates will spend part of their weekend at the annual Baptism Retreat, May 13-14. During the retreat, the candidates will learn the details of the Sunday morning ceremony, spending time with pastors and Chuck and Belinda Davis, who were the first Sunday School teachers for many of our candidates.

All of the preparation for baptism is an integral part of Broadway's emphasis on faith formation for young Disciples. Faith education, promoting the active participation of children and youth in our worship services, and welcoming the presence of young children and those with special needs in our worship, are all part of the faith formation journey at Broadway. The first steps toward baptism happen every Sunday, and long before fifth grade!

In worship bulletins on May 15, there will be a list—a very long list. The names of all those who have been baptized at Broadway during the past 58 years is an



impressive one. Next year, the 2016 baptismal candidates will see their names added. And they will forever be a part of the history of Broadway and forever a part of the Body of Christ.

On Pentecost Sunday, our newly baptized Disciples will join disciples of ages past—stepping out into a skeptical world in uncertain times, but equipped with the knowledge that Jesus (and Broadway) will walk alongside them.

They came to be called *Rites of Passage*, the ceremonies that mark critical passages of life. I know for me these occur regularly, some anticipated and others not.

During the span of one month I will have married, buried, baptized, dedicated and blessed people as they moved from one state of being to another. Some of those are developmental; coming of age is marked by rituals that escort young people into adulthood. Others represent passages of crisis, life changing at the extremities. We walk a tight wire between life and death, love and loss, and the past and the future.

One phenomena that takes place in rituals of transformation is *liminality*. This is the state of being inbetween the times or places: I used to be this way but now that's gone. I lost what used to define me so now I must find another. The world shifts and new worlds groan into being.

Liminality is powerful because when all the balls are in the air we are also positioned at an intersection of great possibility. The Bible is full of symbolism of liminality. Rivers often represent liminal passages – crossing the river, walking the waters, plunging beneath. So does wilderness wandering. And the number forty is always laden with liminal significance. Jesus spends forty days in the wilderness, between



here and there, tested and tried, so that he may be transformed toward his destiny.

And yet liminal times and the people who pass through them may be perceived as dangerous. The person who has just passed through a death or divorce or deployment or drug rehab is outside the structure of the normal. They are enchanted.

sometimes even fearful to others.


Since life is in a perpetual state of change and nothing is permanent it is fair to say that *life itself is liminal*. Just as we adjusted to the last shift another one appears. And everything on the inside of us is in flux as well. If there is one powerful way to describe what the church is called to do it is this: We are the ones called to stand in the domain of passage and places of change. We stand beside persons as they make daunting and critical journeys. We speak of the Lord of life who is the author of transformation and resurrection. Out of death and endings comes new life and beginnings.

We are people of the passage. Though we walk through the valley of the shadow of liminality ... we shall fear no evil. Thy rod and Thy staff they comfort us.

# Talking and Listening to Heal Moral Injury

## All the Way Home Begins Healing Circles for Veterans

Have you noticed? Men, in general, love to talk about their feelings—those intimate details that help others understand what is underneath the anger, the hurt, the despair.

As most of us know, that sweeping generalization is far from true. When combat service is added into a cultural reluctance to talk about subjects like stress, depression and moral injury, the results can be catastrophic. Suicide rates for combat veterans continue to climb and there is no easy answer on how to stop the relentless increase in deaths.



All the Way Home, along with other like-minded veterans' support groups, is taking the lead on working with combat veterans who are dealing with serious moral injuries. Moral injuries may never heal without the help of trained professionals, mentors and other veterans who have experienced the soul-scaring trauma of combat.

Healing Circles for veterans dealing with moral injury will take place at Broadway on the first and third Sundays each month from 2:00-4:00 p.m. The Circles will take place in the Loft. Healing Circles allow combat veterans a safe and confidential setting to talk about the causes and behaviors associated with moral injury.

The Circles are open to all, men and women, who have served in a combat zone. Whether that experience was in the Korean peninsula in the 1950s, or in the mountains of Afghanistan in 2012, the door is open. Patriot Place is an outreach to veterans from the Columbia Housing Authority, the Truman VA Hospital,



Veterans United and Welcome Home to provide a one-stop service hub for veterans. Patriot Place will not only include housing in studio apartments, but long-term plans include space for counseling, medical and emergency needs.

## Highlights from the April Board Meeting

The Board of Broadway Christian Church met for its regular meeting on April 26, 2016. The following is a brief summary of Board activity.

#### **Information Items:**

Personnel Chair Dana Fritz reported on the committee's progress in the development of Pastoral and Congregational Relations guidelines. The draft is in its third revision, and will likely be presented as an Action Item later this year.

Transportation Committee Report: Marilyn McCreary summarized the findings of the Transportation Committee, with the following recommendations: purchase two 14-passenger, used buses at a cost of between of \$25,000-\$40,000; the Board would authorize a mini-campaign to purchases the buses in fall, 2016; policies for bus use, scheduling and driver qualifications and training developed before a bus is purchased, and; Inclusion of a bus expense line item in the '16-'17 budget.

Leslie Clay moved that the Transportation Committee's recommendations be accepted in the form of a motion; Deb Ward seconded. The motion passed.

By-Laws Review Committee report: Leslie Clay presented the revised by-laws for their 30-day review. The revised by-laws will be voted on at the next Board meeting.

### **Ministry Reports**

**Connections**: Dixie Fisher reported that preparations for the Ladies' Brunch on May 7 are well underway. The committee is looking for a few good men to volunteer in the kitchen during the brunch.

**Property**: Mike Crews detailed several repairs and improvements, including: a new water dispenser outside the Music Center; a new canopy light for the west CLC doors; repainting the preschool wing bathrooms; replacement of upholstered chairs in Fellowship Hall and Conference Room; repainting of outdoor signage. The Adopt-A-Spot program for Broadway flower beds and plantings is in progress.

**Discipleship**: Five adult Christian Ed classes are thriving. Deb Ward said that there could be a need for more classroom space in the near future. For CareLink,

Patsy Dalton reported that the ministry now has an official logo, and is moving forward with publicity in Broadway's print and electronic media. **Service**: Nancy Miller summarized outreach activities: Wine to Water, a cooperative outreach among four Disciples congregations, raised more than \$4000, with Broadway being well-represented; over \$1700 was raised in a special offering for Ecuador earthquake assistance; all 200 plots in the Community Garden are assigned; the 2016 Habitat Sale raised almost \$28,000; nine Broadway members will travel to el Salvador on May 28.

**Worship**: Vicki Keeling-Wallace reported that Broadway's Lent and Easter worship had undergone a review, with an eye on changes and/or additions for Lent/Easter,2017. On June 12, there will be one worship at 10:30 a.m. with all musical styles represented.

Children & Youth: For Youth, Stephanie Zaner thanked the high school juniors and their parents who organized the April 24 Senior Recognition Luncheon. The final Youth Group for the school year will be held May 11. Camp registrations are being taken now. The 7th Grade Sexuality Retreat will take place on May 20. For Children, Shawna Schulte announced that Baby Dedication will take place on May 8. A VBS planning meeting will be held on May 9 at 7 pm. Sunday morning Christian education classes are very strong. On June 4, Children's Ministries will sponsor an All-Church Field Day from 10:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m., which include lunch, games and activities for children and families.

Following the Membership report by Ingrid Luckenbill and a review of church finances by Martha head, Commissioned Minister Terry Overflet presented the following Action Item:

• A scholarship award for Michael Tatum, who will begin attending seminary in January, 2017. The award would total \$3000 (\$500 for each of six semesters).

Following the Ministers' remarks, the meeting was adjourned.
