How will you serve?

The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. federal holiday is a perfect opportunity for Americans to honor Dr. King's legacy through service. The MLK Day of Service empowers individuals, strengthens communities, bridges barriers, creates solutions to social problems, and moves us closer to Dr. King's vision of a beloved community.

After a long struggle, legislation was signed in 1983 creating a federal holiday marking the birthday of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. In 1994, Congress designated the Martin Luther King Jr. Federal Holiday as a national day of service and charged the Corporation for National and Community Service with leading this effort. Taking place each year on the third Monday in January, the MLK Day of Service is the only federal holiday observed as a national day of service – a "day on, not a day off." The MLK Day of Service is a part of United We Serve, the President's national call to service initiative. It calls for Americans from all walks of life to work together to provide solutions to our most pressing national problems. The MLK Day of Service empowers individuals, strengthens communities, bridges barriers, creates solutions to social problems, and moves us closer to Dr. King's vision of a "Beloved Community."

This year's key message is: Engaging Americans in Creating Economic Opportunity.

Dr. King worked hard to fight for the rights and freedoms form Americans to have a better life. This MLK Day, as you are thinking of service projects for your program, you may want to consider projects which provide training, services, or messaging for things like financial literacy, tax assistance, employment opportunities, civic engagement, and more.

Other major initiatives of the Corporation for National and Community Service include working to help families and individuals sign up for the **Affordable Care Act**. Americans without healthcare coverage is at an all-time low, however, this means that those still without coverage are even harder to reach and assist. Your organization might want to consider having a sign-up event or provide information on the Affordable Care Act at another event.

Finally, the White House has recently launched a special initiative to reach out to **Rural Communities** -- many of which are experiencing joblessness and poverty. If your program serves a rural community, you may consider teaming up with other organizations and programs to plan a large-scale project for greatest impact.

This toolkit will provide your program with everything it needs to get started planning for this year's MLK Day of Service. MLK Day Historical Timeline

April 8, 1968 Legislation introduced for federal holiday commemorating Dr. King. 1983

Congress passes & Pres Reagan signs legislation creating MLK Day as a national holiday

Jan 20, 1986

First national celebration of the MLK holiday takes place.

1994

Coretta Scott King goes before Congress, quotes 1968 sermon "The Drum Major Instinct," & requests that MLK Day be official national day of service. Congress approves.

Getting Started

When you're planning your event, be sure to consider how you are connecting to: 1) Dr. King's legacy; 2) improving economic opportunity for all Americans; and 3) promoting year-round service opportunities. For the 2016 MLK Day of Service, CNCS encourages organizations to carry out projects which advance economic opportunities, support rural communities, encourage enrollment in the Affordable Care Act, support veterans and military families, promote education, and help communities prepare for or recover from disasters.

Economic Advancement/ Financial Literacy

- Host a tax preparation clinic.
- Organize a free financial literacy/savings workshop.
- Host a kids and money workshop event.

Poverty

- Organize a canned food drive for your local shelter or food bank.
- Organize a drive for blankets, gloves, etc. the homeless in your community.
- Host an Affordable Care Act Sign-Up Event
- Organize a toy drive to provide less fortunate children in the community with toys and games.

Education

- Organize a school supply or book drive.
- Host a story time event reading from books about Dr. King and his legacy.
- Organize a mural project at a school, library or community center

Military/Veterans

- Assemble care packages for military members overseas.
- Identify military families in need of yard sprucing, home repairs, etc. and organize a day of work at their home.

Disaster Preparedness

- Conduct a house-to-house smoke alarm check.
- Organize a drive for preparedness supplies to donate to local churches, community centers, etc.
- Offer CPR & Preparedness Basics training.

How to Register Your Project

- 1. As soon as you have details on your project, register it on www.nationalservice.gov/mlkday by December 15, 2015.
- 2. Click on Register on NationalService.gov. Fill out online form and click on Submit.
- 3. Go back to www.nationalservice.gov/mlkday, and Click on Register on AllforGood.org. Fill out online form and click on Submit. You must register your project on BOTH sites!
- 4. You are ready to go!

Partnerships

As your begin planning your service projects for MLK Day 2016, think of potential partners in your community and statewide who might be able to make your efforts even more successful.

Potential Partners

- Other National Service programs in your community (or across Virginia) with a similar focus area.
- Nonprofits, community service organizations, or government agencies in your community with a similar focus area.
- Corporations or businesses looking for outreach projects in the community.

Working with Government Officials

Once you have some details on your event, we encourage you to reach out to local./state/federal officials and leaders. These individuals can be valuable resources to your organization and can become an important partner in accomplishing your goals. Officials can be invited to:

- Attend your event (or send staff to attend)
- Write a Proclamation in your community.
- Make keynote remarks at your event.
- Create a video greeting if they cannot be there in person.
- Write a letter of congratulations to your volunteers and organization.
- Post information about your event on their social media channels.

Promoting MLK Day

Overall Theme

"Engaging Americans in Creating Economic Opportunity"

Key Messages

- Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. once said, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is, 'What are you doing for others?'" Against what seemed like impossible odds, Dr. King and scores of his fellow citizens of all races came together and, ultimately, helped bend the moral arc of the universe toward justice.
- In recognition of Dr. King's incredible legacy of service to all, Congress designated the Martin Luther King Jr. Federal Holiday as a national day of service in 1994, and charged the Corporation for National and Community Service with leading this effort.
- Taking place each year on the third Monday in January, the MLK Day of Service is the only federal holiday observed as a national day of service a "day on, not a day off."
- The upcoming commemoration of the MLK Day of Service on Monday, January 18th is an opportunity to remember that history and re-commit ourselves as citizens by volunteering in service to one another. It is also a time to consider how much work still remains to fulfill Dr. King's dream. Service is a powerful tool for strengthening our communities, but it is only a start.
- As we work together, we will create economic opportunities by improving education, strengthening health care services, and improving financial literacy. These are central to making our economy work for every American.
- An appropriate way to honor Dr. King is through service and volunteering in our communities. Dr. King devoted his life to advancing equality, social justice, and economic opportunity for all. He challenged us to build a more perfect union and taught us that everyone has a role to play. Five decades later, we still have work to do to realize Dr. King's dream.
