

It's Time to Soar!

Dear Friends of Mayer Lutheran High School,

Summertime greetings to you in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

As a longtime student and teacher of history, one of my favorite accounts involves two bicycle mechanics from Dayton, Ohio who first demonstrated heavier-than-air flight. Orville and Wilbur Wright were remarkable men. While they are credited with inventing the airclane, they also revealed timeless truths for

they are credited with inventing the airplane, they also revealed timeless truths for us to consider today. As keen observers of nature, they studied birds to unlock the secret of flight, moving Wilbur to comment, "No bird soars in a calm." That truth led them to find the windiest place in the United States to try their flying machine, Kitty Hawk, North Carolina on the sandy Outer Banks. It was near Kitty Hawk, on Kill Devil Hill, four miles south of town, where they successfully achieved controlled powered flight on December 17, 1903. What a remarkable achievement for two aspiring scientists with little formal training!

I'm sure that most of the 3,100 graduates of Mayer Lutheran High School have not soared in a calm. Hard things awaited them and during those times they grew in character, wisdom, and faith. College, career, family, church life, mortgages, illness, uncertain economic times all cause our kids to soar as they rise to the meet the challenge that certainly will confront them. As I look back at my life, the Lord has blessed me and my family to overcome some significantly difficult days, and we are the better for them. I pray that you, too, recognize how your greatest growth as a person was the result of tumult and, through it all, you were never alone.

The next year provides an opportunity for our school to soar as we approach some major initiatives. A new web site and address will be online beginning in August (www.mayerlutheran. org). Our social media presence will increase as we are blessed to have able assistance in telling our story to the world in this most exciting and effective way. In the next couple of years, we anticipate staff changes as retirement looms on the horizon for a few of my colleagues. And, by the grace of God, we will undertake an ambitious building project that will totally change the face of our campus and enable many more people to experience the magic of Mayer Lutheran. Certainly, the next year will not be calm. It will be a challenge. We will not be alone.

Fortunately for all of us, God knows we have tough days ahead and that they are good for us. When the Children of Israel were about ready to enter the promised land and face some formidable fighters, the Lord told them, "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them. For the LORD your God goes with you; he will never leave you or forsake you. (Deut. 31:6)" Paul echoes those words when he encouraged the early Christians facing devastating persecution: "What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things? (Romans 8:31-32)" Jesus experienced the worse kind of storm when He was crucified on the cross. On Easter, though, He conquered death and forty days later soared into Heaven where He is preparing a place for us.

Few enjoy the storms of life. While we are buffeted by them, we can easily lose hope and purpose. Yet, God provides great assurance and comfort in His Word at exactly those times. He knows, like the birds he created, that we do not soar in a calm, and He's good with that. I pray you are too!



It's likely that you're familiar with some of the top-rated marketing campaigns of all time—UNICEF's Tap Project: it was engineered during a lunch meeting. Dave Droga of Droga5 Marketing created an award winning campaign by "branding" water. His idea received a three page spread in Esquire magazine. The result—it raised over \$2 million dollars for UNICEF's project to provide safe drinking water for people in need.

Another example—Prior to 2006 no one asked if they were a Mac or a PC person, but that all changed when marketing firm TBWA launched what would eventually become 66 commercials that each creatively asked this little question. The campaign, called "Get a Mac," was a bit of a comedy featuring a rather boring looking Bill Gates (PC) look-alike who was no match for the Steve Jobs (Mac) hipster dude. The skit was so popular it found its way into a South Park episode.

Recognized as a marketing campaign that's a cut above all the rest, Dove's Campaign for Real Beauty, set the marketing world on its ear by breaking the promotion stereotype of beauty. Instead of the super slim, plastic surgery constructed "beauty" of the fast-track super model, Dove set out to tell a real story of beauty. It touched a nerve around the world. Marketing campaign evaluator Sergio Alcocer quipped, "I still remember the first time I saw Dove's 'Real Beauty Campaign.' So inspiring. It brought truth to advertising." Hummm, it was groundbreaking simply because it told the truth. Finally.



Wow, another year has flown by, and as the one who coordinates school service events, it has been a joy to watch the students at Mayer Lutheran High School live out their faith in so many ways. Many of our service activities have their origins in a class called Christian Leadership. Each student in the class is responsible to help with the organization of a school-wide service project. This past year, students held fall and spring blood drives, two trips to Feed My Starving Children, and a fundraising appeal for our school-sponsored Compassion child named Fernando. The drive resulted in raising enough money to sponsor him for an entire year! A Remedy Drive concert helped support Ysleta Lutheran Mission's "Stay in School Scholarship." This program works to keep children in Anapra, Mexico, in school after sixth grade.

Our annual mission trip to the El Paso/Juarez area saw over a quarter of our students serving across the border in Anapra. A

group of nearly 50 students and 25 adults developed relationships and encouraged the people of that community while building five small homes and spending time with the children we have grown to love. We have over 40 students already signed up for next year.

Other opportunities to serve happened through the fall "Senior Give Back Day," where groups of MLHS seniors went to schools, homes of the elderly, local food shelves, or stayed right here at school, serving their neighbors in a variety of ways. Our National Honor Society also joined the effort with some service activities of their own, including the "mini library" efforts, and ditch cleanup. Many of our students are also involved in their own service efforts at the congregational level, where the love that they have received from God through His Son Jesus, shines through in many tangibles ways. It's been a good year!


2015 Trapshooting Team

The Crusader Claybreakers Trapshooting Team had a great competition season. The team consists of 27 boys and girls from MLHS and from neighboring schools. The team finished their season in FIRST PLACE in their conference! The team had three shooters that shot perfect 25 for 25 rounds: Jeremiah Elliot (two), Monte Monchamp, and Kate Esser. Jeremiah also went 49 for 50 for the team's high score for a night's shooting. Twenty-four shooters participated in the State Competition held in Alexandria, MN, June 12—ten students shooting at the varsity level (average scores of 19–25) and 14 shooting at the junior varsity level (average scores of 15–18). Monte Monchamp and Jeremiah Elliot ended the season on the top 100 individual shooters in the state and both have qualified for the MSHSL State Championships. Elli Marten tied for 3rd place as the female high scorer at the state meet with 84 out of 100.

Don't Take A Vacation



Have you ever heard the phrase "use it or lose it?" Use it or lose it has been spoken to athletes and students in various ways. Acquired skills or knowledge will fade away without repetition and use. Consider the student who crams for an exam. They may remember enough to earn an acceptable grade, but ask them to take the test a week later and the results are likely to be considerably worse. Athletes are pushed to be involved in skill development in and out of season

and this is, in part, caused by the desire to not have skills decline due to lack of repetition.

Some who have studied what it takes to truly master a skill or excel at it have determined that it can take 6-10 years of working at it to obtain true mastery of that skill or genuine expertise in an area. Another study suggests that it takes 10,000 focused hours (1,250 eight hour work days) to get to this level.

Teachers see the skill and knowledge atrophy that occurs in their students after time away from the classroom. Summer break, though a great reprieve from the rigors of school, do cause students to lose skills and knowledge. This is why some school districts across the country have changed to year-round school. These districts cite that more academic progress gets made because there is less re-teaching that needs to occur.

Summer, for some, will also cause spiritual atrophy. People will find themselves distracted from being in the Word, keeping up personal and family devotion schedules, and attending worship. Although, for those who believe in Christ as their Savior, this is not a salvation issue it is a spiritual growth stagnation issue. When we are not in contact with God and in communion with His saints we are not being fed by Word and Sacrament.

Being fed spiritually is important because we are called to ...always be prepared to give and answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have (1 Peter 3:15, NIV). The world and our sinful flesh attempt to make us feel that we are inadequate to give an answer. But we are not. By being spiritually fed and in shape, we find that we are more than equipped to share that salvation that can only be found in Christ because He paid the price for our sin and rose to give us the certainty of eternal life. When we articulate this hope, the Holy Spirit does miraculous things in the lives of people, whether they are wavering in their faith or hearing the Gospel for the first time.
