Ketchum Arts Commission Sponsors Free Dance/Music/Arts Performance

Boise-Based LED, Innovative Performing Arts Group, at The Spot Aug. 29

KETCHUM, Idaho – The Ketchum Arts Commission will host Boise-based LED in a free performance combining dance, music and the visual arts on Saturday, Aug. 29 at 8 p.m. at The Spot at 220 Lewis St.

Founders and leaders of LED are the husband-and-wife duo of Lauren Edson and Andrew Stensaas. Edson is a former Trey McIntyre Project dancer and choreographer whose original pieces have been performed at venues including the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., and Jacob's Pillow Dance Center in Becket, Mass. Stensaas is a singer/songwriter composer and member of the Boise band Edmond Dantes.

Their Ketchum performance, "Barbarian Princess," features six dancers and four musicians, along with costumes designed by Project Runway winner Michelle Lesniak and digital projections created by the filmmaker and digital designer Kyle Morck of Boise. The dancers have performed with both traditional ballet companies such as the Washington Ballet, the Oakland Ballet and Ballet Idaho and contemporary dance companies such as Boise's Trey McIntyre Project and Hubbard Street Dance Chicago.

LED's performance in Ketchum is part of a multi-city Pacific Northwest tour, culminating in a major debut at the Morrison Center in Boise in October. This is the second dance-oriented performance sponsored by the Ketchum Arts Commission this summer.

The group chose LED, most often known as an abbreviation for light-emitting diode, for its name because the LED represents innovation, malleability and leadership.
