FBS Completes First Building in Multi-Building Expansion Program for North Dakota Tribes

The first of four buildings being constructed by Fullerton Building Systems for a North Dakota Native American nation and casino operator has been completed and turned over to the client, the MHA Nation, based in New Town, North Dakota.

The initial building is an 4,600 square foot communications center for the Four Bears, North Dakota, segment of the Indian nation, which consists of three affiliated tribes--the Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara—who jointly own and operate the 4Bears Casino & Lodge of the Fort Berthold Reservation in New Town.

Work on the second structure in the multi-building contract--a 5,300 square foot center in Roseglen, North Dakota, to house the tribes' Headstart education programs--is underway, with an anticipated October 1 completion date. Its construction is being overseen by Mark Fox, MHA Nation chairman, and Fred Fox, White Shield segment council representative.

Two additional buildings are in the planning stages: a new community center and a large elder center, both in Twin Buttes, North Dakota, with fall construction start dates. Overseeing their construction for the MHA Nation is Cory Spotted Bear, Twin Buttes segment council representative.

Commenting on the project, Dave Walock, president of Fullerton Companies, said that tribal management "selected our 'quick-build' system for the same reasons as our many other clients---like McDonald's, Starbucks, Taco John, and retail, apartment and office developers nationwide: to get new facilities up and operating in the quickest, most efficient way possible, It's simply a better, faster method of building than traditional on-site construction systems."

Walock said that FBS worked closely with MHA Nation’s architects, DJR Architecture, Inc. of Minneapolis, “to create factory-applied exterior finishes that harmonize with the prairie settings of each of the buildings.”

“Our factory-applied cultured stone and brick facades are delivering higher quality, higher value buildings to MHA Nation, without the weather-related risks and delays associated with building on-site,” Walock said, “and at no additional cost over traditional construction methods.”
