# Our Christian Identity Sportsmen – Part 2

We began looking at New Testament athletic metaphors in the August newsletter, elaborating in terms of the intensity and self-control required of winning athletes and victorious Christians. We continue.

### **Purpose**

Well, I do not run aimlessly; I do not box as one beating the air; (1 Cor 9:26)

Athletes have a purpose. They have a goal. They don't run "aimlessly." They run with intention. They don't box the air. They aim to place their fist right on the tip of their opponent's nose. Their aim is to win the race or the match. So also the Christian life. Our rigorous training, our self-denial, our delayed gratification aims at effectively serving Christ. Self-indulgence of some passion or succumbing to the immediate gratification of some lust would be ruinous to our witness and service. Christians must live with focus, pouring all their energy into the race, aiming every punch at the target, which is the honor of Christ, the glory of God, and the salvation of souls. All our resources and energy are poured into this.

Run to win. Run for the reward. We anticipate not a perishable reward, as are all earthly rewards, but an imperishable.

#### Adherence to rules

Athletes have to play according to the rules. If they don't, they will be disqualified (v 27). If runners, swimmers, or skaters wander out of the lanes, if shot-putters and javelin throwers step over the lines, they are disqualified. The Apostle Paul says elsewhere,

An athlete is not crowned unless he competes according to the rules. (2 Tim 2:5)

Christians play according to the rules. What rules? God's rules. He designed the games. He officiates the games. He is the umpire. One might find the lines of the basketball court restrictive; the rule against two-handed dribbling might seem arbitrary; tackling the opponent as he crosses the mid-court line might seem reasonable. However, if we all play according to our own rules, the result is chaos. The whole game shuts down. The game, as an identifiable entity, ceases to exist and gives way to anarchy. So it is for the Christian. It's God's game, God's rules, and God's officiating. Our task is to play by the rules. Rules are good things. They make non-chaotic life possible. Honor the rules.

#### Reward

Finally, we compete for the reward. The Apostle regularly refers to winning the "prize" (v 24), the "wreath" (v 25, probably the crown of foliage, the *stephanos*, awarded at the Olympic and Isthmian games). Because the Apostle "finished the race," he anticipated

receiving "the crown (stephanos) of righteousness,"

which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award to me on that Day, and not only to me but also to all who have loved his appearing. (2 Tim 4:8)

Run to win. Run for the reward. We anticipate not a perishable reward, as are all earthly rewards, but an imperishable. "Therefore," says the writer to the Hebrews,

since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God. (Heb 12:1, 2)

Let us then shed "every encumbrance" and every sin "which so easily entangles us," and do what? "Run with endurance the race" in which we are called to compete (NASB).

# Children's Ministry

# Dear Parents,

Memorization of the *Shorter Catechism* has been a rite of passage for Presbyterian children for nearly 350 years. It is daunting for parents to undertake to catechize their children. Consequently, every four years Sunday School becomes "catechism school," that is, a year-long class to help our parents. It will be conducted from September 6, 2015 – August 28, 2016 for our 5<sup>th</sup>—8<sup>th</sup> graders who have not previously taken this class.

However, as catechizing is primarily a parental responsibility, so also it is an undertaking which cannot succeed without parental involvement. Here is what we'd like from you.

- Attend the first class on September 6
  with your child/children. Attendance
  at this class will provide you with
  a first-hand understanding of the
  requirements of the class and your
  participation during the year.
- Read *The Family Worship Book*, pages 10-12 for background on the subject of catechizing and page 77 for background on *The Shorter Catechism*.
- 3. Review for 5 minutes per day the questions for the week and answers that have not yet been committed to memory. A little bit each day goes a long way.
- Pray that the subjects discussed in the catechism would lodge not only in the head but in the heart.
- 5. Post the enclosed schedule at home so that you'll be able to keep pace. The big dates are:

December 20, 27 – Recitations on Questions 1-38 May 8, 15 – Recitations on Questions 39-81

August 21, 28 –

Recitations on Questions 82-107

Jody Robinson, Paul Carpenter and I will do our best. But your daily involvement is essential. Class time itself will be one-half instructional and one-half recitational, but handled in a way that visitors and those who fall behind will not feel alienated.

There they not only hear a lesson from God's word but they review elements of our service, preparing them for their time to stay during the morning hour. This is a vital part of the ministry to our children.

For the past two years our Children's Church has been led by Allison Kelly. Allison has taken and strengthened our Children's Church into a well-run educational ministry. She was instrumental in changing our curriculum to *The Jesus Storybook Bible*. She also recruited a number of volunteers so each member is scheduled to teach only once a calendar year. As her service draws to a close, on behalf of a very grateful congregation, we would like to thank Allison for her faithful dedication to our children.

Another group of members who have gone above and beyond to teach and encourage our children is our Diaconate. One would be hard-pressed to find another church where a group of ordained officers has stepped forward to teach Children's Church each Sunday. # Why We Invest a Year of Catechizing

The catechizing of children is the historic method that has been employed by Presbyterian churches for the instruction of covenant children since the time of the Reformation. The catechism format is that of question and answer:

#### Q. What is the chief end of man?

A. Man's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy Him forever;

This system committed to memory, covering the whole scheme of Christian theology, is the tested and proven means of transmitting the content of our faith to our children.

Every four years we offer an opportunity during our Sunday School hour for our

children to participate in the instruction of catechizing and learning the *Westminster Confession of Faith*. Beginning September 6, during the Sunday School hour, we will be providing an intensive catechism class for 1<sup>st</sup> – 4<sup>th</sup> (*Children's Catechism*) and 5<sup>th</sup> – 8<sup>th</sup> (*Westminster Shorter Catechism*) graders while our 9<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> graders will be taught *The Westminster Confession of Faith*. We encourage our children and their parents to enthusiastically join in this endeavor to learn the catechisms and study the confession in this coming year.

Parents of 5<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> graders, you are encouraged to attend the first class with your child in order to glean an understanding of what the curriculum will cover.

# Psalm 78

Psalm 78 is a historical Psalm. From this we learn that there is much of value in the study of the history of Israel. It provides "a narrative of the great mercies God had bestowed upon Israel, the great sins wherewith they had provoked him, and the many tokens of his displeasure they had been under, for their sins," says Matthew Henry. It is put in poetic and singing form, Henry continues, "that it might be better remembered, and transmitted to posterity, that the singing of it might affect them with the things here related, more than they would be with a bare narrative of them."

The Psalm is a "parable," an "instructive story or saying" meant to illustrate truth, "hidden things" (NIV, v 2) by which is meant the record of the past, which by itself is "a tangle of events, an enigma or riddle needing interpretation," says

Motyer. He continues: "This then is the purpose of the psalm: to clarify the riddle of the past so that it becomes a lesson for present and future."

The purpose of this recounting is found in verses 7,8: that the people of God should not be stubborn like their ancestors, whose rebellion is traced from the exodus to 1 Samuel. The psalmist traces God's continuing faithfulness culminating in His provision of David to shepherd His people (vv 65-72). However, even David was not a final solution to Israel's waywardness, as he points beyond himself to a greater than David, a Son of David, Jesus the Good Shepherd, who lays down His life for His sheep (Mt 1:1; Jn 10:14,15).

But when I am having those thoughts, I thank God that I am making a sacrifice to tithe. My "sacrifice" of giving money to the church is incomparable to the sacrifice made by Jesus Christ. The daily blessings I receive from my relationship with Christ overshadow any sum of money I could give. I am blessed that I can demonstrate obedience to God by tithing. I am blessed that my tithe can help our church spread God's truth. I am blessed that through my obedience I get to enjoy the promises of God. I get to eat the bread of life. I get to drink water that will cause me to never thirst. I will get to hear our Father tell me, "well done good and faithful servant." I will get to enter the joy of my master. 




