


Greetings!



Dorcas had the ability and talent of sewing. She saw the need and she served to fulfill it. Dorcas and her widow friends got together to serve the poor, the widows, the fatherless. From her first work grew many Dorcas Sewing Societies worldwide. Edith Deen wrote that Dorcas' tool was a needle; her workshop was her home. But also she had desires, ideas, mercy, hope, love and faith that called for an action.

Remembering Dorcas' story does not mean that you are going to be noticed, known or famous. That is not the motivation or purpose. What I want to assure you is that you are a talented woman! You are talented because you have the image and nature of GOD. God does not send any child without gifts.
