

EXPLANATION

The Annual Meeting was originally scheduled for 24 January 2016, but it was cancelled due to a snowstorm. The meeting was subsequently postponed to and held on 31 January 2016.

Paper documents distributed at the meeting were all dated 24 January 2016.

This version of the Annual Report has been updated to include all reports, including those distributed under separate cover and those submitted after the meeting itself.

Interim Rector's Report

While I have been with you only since September, I somehow feel I have come to know many of you quite well. St. Peter's is a vibrant and exciting place, and sometimes that energy causes us to appear as confusing or chaotic. (And sometimes, we *are* confusing or chaotic—but that's a story for another narrative!)

As a community, we are living in the tension of the "between time," and that can be difficult for many of us. (That also includes me, and I have engaged *only* in interim ministry in recent years!) According to one expert source, "The interim-leadership needs of a vital, mission-focused congregation that has lost its pastor, no matter what the circumstances, are not for less leadership, but for at least as much, if not more, leadership." That presents a special challenge to us, as I am contracted to work only *half* of full-time. It also presents a special challenge to us at St. Peter's in that our beloved former rector, Stephanie Wethered, retired because of a medical disability. So, all of the emotions that an individual experiences in grief are present in our congregation, because we have suffered such a significant loss.

People in grief experience difficult emotions, yes, but they also have choices. In the practice of pastoral ministry over 20+ years, I lump families that have experienced the loss of a loved one into two broad categories: first, there are those who come together, love each other, and try hard—in the face of great adversity—to support each other, and, second, there are those families that fight, wrestle for control, and malign each other. At St. Peter's in this interim time, we have some of each. My point is simply that this is a *choice*, and I encourage you to walk in love, to employ a hermeneutic of charity, and to help support me and our fellow parishioners. We all need to work together to the glory of God, and I need everyone's help in this regard.

Experts² tell us there are five realities that make interim ministry—and pastoral ministry in general—more challenging today than it ever has been:

- 1) Resistance to change. We have certainly seen this at St. Peter's. Why, there are even some who complained that we changed the style of our contribution envelopes—can you honestly imagine anything less important than that? We all like stability in our lives, but life without change leads to stagnation, atrophy, and death—things, I hope, we want to avoid. So, please, let's try to "go with the flow" and accept that change is inevitable and a little change can actually be helpful.
- 2) The need to redefine purpose and mission in our contemporary context. We are not ministering in the same context as in 1893, when this parish was founded, or 1955, when the church was built. We need to work out together what our mission is in this fast-changing environment we call the twenty-first century. We need to agree that compliance with rules and regulations is a priority, that equity for all of our people is important, and that consulting with our natural partners is a

helpful thing. For too long, we have relied on informal practices that do not serve us well, and we have repeatedly "re-invented the wheel" rather than ask others who have wisdom to share. Quite simply put, we do not need to make mistakes other people have made—we can learn from their experience.

- 3) The need to exercise viable Christian stewardship. This may be our most significant challenge at St. Peter's, where financial giving is, quite frankly, appalling. Oh, I know: some of you are giving sacrificially, some are tithing, and some are contributing well beyond your means. But others are giving time *instead* of money, are contributing only a few dollars a week, or—worse yet—are withholding support of your parish as some kind of protest. The treasure we have is really not ours, but entrusted to our care by God, given to us with a call to responsible stewardship, to look after the needs of future generations, to provide for generations yet unborn.
- 4) Conflict and tension resulting from social issues. The gospel of Jesus Christ compels the church to lead in the quest for a just and equitable society. There has always been a tension between those who insist that the church must be at the forefront of this quest and those who demand that the church "stay out of politics." This is not a tension we will resolve anytime soon. But what would it be like if we agreed to live in the tension, rather than badmouth each other simply because we disagree?
- 5) Increasing diversity in American society and a consequent blurring of differences in religious traditions. Writing in 1989, an expert predicted this: "The approaching new century brings with it the question of whether local congregations will be able to give up their parochial, traditional, edifice-oriented ways to further a new, more ecumenical and less competitive model of the church." Are we even asking the right questions, I wonder?

So, that's where we are: in the difficult "between time," struggling to find a way forward, anxious for stability, and sometimes even afraid of what may lie ahead.

There is much at this parish church that should be celebrated and affirmed: ministries of music, pastoral caring, outreach, and youth; a competent and devoted staff; a nursery school that provides a nurturing environment to young learners; a thrift shop that offers quality discount merchandise and a listening ear to clients; and an associate rector with integrity, vibrancy, and commitment—the list goes on and on.

Yet there is also a way in which we lack the necessary infrastructure to support all this. We have a lot of work to do, my friends. We need new volunteers to help shape policy, to monitor our finances, to lead a year-round stewardship conversation, to oversee our property, to help update our history for our 125th anniversary (2018), to coordinate our hospitality, and—most urgently of all—to strategize about how to build up the body of Christ and increase our active membership.

The time is now, the need is urgent, and the call has come: please take your place in the reconciling ministry of God in Christ, testifying to the good news of God's grace.

LITURGY

We have made quite a few little changes and adjustments to our worship in this interim period. The *Onward*, our monthly newsletter, contains explanations of most of these in some detail, as well as a rationale for each decision. Here's a brief summary; we are:

- Sticking to the book (using authorized rites from the *Book of Common Prayer*, with only rare incorporation of supplemental materials)
- Confessing first, for the most part
- Singing an additional hymn at 10am
- Ceased publishing a book most weeks (and instead have reverted to a simpler service leaflet)

There may be a few more tweaks here and there—just some things to try, to help us join the ecumenical consensus, or to bring us into greater conformity with what is normative in the Episcopal Church in 2016. The idea is to continue to *try* things—some of which may become permanent and some of which probably will not.

St. Peter's continues to offer Morning Prayer in the chapel. Morning Prayer is a 15-minute service that includes the reading of psalms, Bible lessons, and prayers, according to *The Book of Common Prayer*. Morning Prayer is offered Tuesday-Friday from 8:30 to 8:45am in the chapel.

CHRISTIAN FORMATION

Saint Peter's Youth

We continue to have an active and strong youth program at St. Peter's. SPY meets twice a month on Sunday evenings with a typical attendance of 10 kids at JR SPY (grades 6 to 8) and 15 at SR SPY (high school).

In July, 17 of our SPY kids and six chaperones, went on a mission trip for one week to Ponce, Puerto Rico, and helped build a fence and paint a house for a local family in need. This upcoming July, the mission trip will in Virginia Beach, Va.

Adult Confirmation 2016

Classes in preparation for adult Confirmation will begin in February and conclude in April. The confirmation will take place at the cathedral in Newark on April 24.

Lectio Divina Bible Study Group

Lectio Divina is an ancient, monastic approach to praying the Bible, in which one encounters the Word of God through prayer, silence, and contemplation. At St. Peter's we offer group Lectio Divina, in which we share in discussion, prayer and silence in experiencing God's transforming love. There is a core group of about 8 people who attend faithfully. This group meets the first and third Wednesday of every month in the main church.

Adult Education:

Advent Series on Centering Prayer

During the 2015 season of Advent, for the first time in quite a few years, St. Peter's offered an adult formation series. For the series, we explored the Christian contemplative tradition, with a particular emphasis on Centering Prayer. The class consisted of lectures, group discussion, videos, and the actual practice of Centering Prayer. The average attendance through the four week series was about 12 people.

DAVID ST. GEORGE FUND

It was a great year for the David St. George Committee! We had \$34,400 to disburse. Many thanks go to the OpShop and its volunteers for the \$20,000 they contributed this year. The additional \$14,400 was from the fund itself. We had 14 grant requests, 2 of which, St. Peter's Morristown's bilingual after school program and the Senior Resource Center, were new. We also allocated funds to Christine's Kitchen who did not submit an application; Habitat for Humanity, in memory of Tim Cutting Sr.; and the two priests' discretionary accounts.

I'd also like to thank returning committee members, June Cowell, Tamara Bross, Fred Jenkins, Bunny Jenkins & Jennifer Vonderahe (vestry), and new members, Evan McLaughlin, Mitch Goodrich, Nathalia Bernardo & Lynn Livingston (OpShop). It was a thoughtful, intelligent, caring and respectful group! This year we did things a little differently than in the past and had each committee member investigate 1 or 2 of the organizations from which we received grant applications. We then met on November 30th to "report" our findings and discuss the organizations. We took a week to each rank the 14 applicants based on their applications and our discussion, then came back together on December 7th to distribute the funds. This new way of doing things was extremely well received by committee members.

We also used a new guide (mission) developed from last year's meeting to help us in our decisions: "The David St. George Outreach Endowment Committee is an outreach committee of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Essex Fells, N.J. Its purpose is to distribute funds to organizations or groups, within the communities of St. Peter's and the Diocese of Newark, who seek to assist struggling individuals with food, shelter, education and/or support in hopes that they may one day be able to support and care for themselves. The distributed funds will be given in response to grant requests, submitted by these organizations, after prayerful consideration, discussion and investigation by the committee members. The aim of the committee is to not only assist individuals in need, but to focus on smaller organizations or projects for whom our limited resources would have the most impact."

COMMUNICATIONS & TECHNOLOGY

With input from clergy and other staff, a weekly newsletter "Life at Saint Peter's" is designed and distributed using Constant Contact. 





In the past three years, the investments have decreased by \$300,00 due to the need to balance the Church operating budget and market declines in the portfolio, offset by investment income.






ESSEX FELLS, NEW JERSEY
