Historic Wilmington Foundation 2015 Annual Awards Honor Preservationists

This year's Preservation Awards ceremony was held on Thursday, May 22 at the historic New Hanover County Courthouse. This capstone event was just one of the many celebrations of National Preservation Month offered by the Foundation during May. The theme for National Preservation Month was "Preservation: A Foundation for the Future" and the awards are a reflection of the preservation at work in our community that inspires and engages the public and helps achieve the goal of preserving and using our historic resources to improve the quality of life in the lower Cape Fear region.

Each year, the Historic Wilmington Foundation Preservation Awards recognize restoration, rehabilitation, compatible new development, as well as preservation leadership and individual contributions to the field. One of the Foundation's highest awards, the **Katherine Howell Award** honors the contributions of a person to the furtherance of the Foundation's mission, and this year's recipient is David P. Thomas of DP Thomas Construction.

The <u>Residents of Old Wilmington (ROW)</u> and <u>Wilmington Downtown (WDI)</u> joined the festivities by each presenting one of their top awards to deserving recipients. ROW presented their annual *Good Neighbor Award* to Phoebe and Terry Bragg and WDI handed out its *Benjamin Halterman Award for Leadership in Preservation* to Don Lashley for the Ironclad Brewery project on North 2nd Street.

Foundation executive director George Edwards expressed great pleasure with the evening's program. "It was a wonderful night. We had a large and enthusiastic crowd of preservation minded people from across our regional service area, and we honored 15 winners with awards of excellence.
