

## ATLANTIC COAST PIPELINE DISCLOSURE

Four major U.S. energy companies—Dominion, Duke Energy, Piedmont Natural Gas and AGL Resources--have joined together to develop, own and operate the Atlantic Coast Pipeline (ACP), an interstate natural gas transmission pipeline. If approved, the ACP will run approximately 550 miles, beginning in West Virginia, running through Virginia and ending in Robeson County, North Carolina. The pipeline will range in width from 42 inches in Virginia to 36 inches in North Carolina and will be buried approximately 3-4 feet underground.

The ACP's proposed route runs through several counties in North Carolina, including Northampton, Halifax, Nash, Wilson, Johnston, Sampson, Cumberland, and Robeson Counties.
