This region was identified by the State's Advisory Council on Dispute Resolution as an area with no domestic mediation services available to families unable to afford private services. To fill this void, K-State's Conflict Resolution Program, the local judiciary, and the Advisory Council proposed an experimental, learning/community-based model providing quality, affordable dispute resolution. With support from the College of Human Ecology and School of Family Studies and Human Services, space was made available to service clients at Mary & Carl Ice Hall. Concurrently, community facilitators saw a need for more engagement zones to accommodate public deliberation/dialog in the region.

In the fall, the Community Development class identified 3 Manhattan sites for consideration. This semester, multidisciplinary student teams in Profs. Gibson and Kingery-Page studios designed sites for a long term Center in Manhattan, while students in CD Workshop identified and designed an alternative site closer to campus. Workshop students also identified additional sites in downtown Junction City that would augment existing services on campus. In the spirit of the project, they welcome your public comment.
