

A few words from Pastor Jennifer

"Now is the winter of our discontent made glorious summer..." so begins Richard III, by William Shake-speare. Seems like a strange place to begin, I know, but the opening words of the play keep coming back to me as I've watched with growing concern the events of this summer as they have evolved around our nation and around our world.

I'm not sure Richard III is alone: it certainly seems that there's a lot of discontent that has bloomed into a full and glorious summer in our world, too. The news reports are full of uprisings, wars, refugees, violence, and crime. The need seems overwhelming, voices of sanity seem few and far between, and the evidence before us suggests that we have much more reason to hold fear and anxiety in our hearts than faith and hope. And, yet...

And, yet... In the fall of 2010, my husband was invited to speak to seminary students regarding his experiences as a National Guard Chaplain. He had been home from Afghanistan less than a year, and was still "jumpy" – fireworks, long traffic lights, kids suddenly running into a street – all these things had been associated with danger during his deployment, and he was still adjusting back to the relative peace of the United States.

During the question and answer period, one of the young students stood up and asked him, "I am wondering how, as an ordained Pastor of Christ's church, you can – with integrity - serve as a Chaplain in the armed services, where you might be deployed into a combat zone. We are to proclaim God's love to the people. In ordination, we promise to do that, and war doesn't seem to be about God's love as much as it is about human sin. Doesn't your service strike you as a conflict of your vows? Doesn't it seem like a conflict of interest?"

I felt my anger rising at the tone of the question, but Greg just nodded. He took a full minute to respond and then, in a gentle voice, he said, "I understand what you're saying and why. But here's my concern: if all ordained clergy refuse to minister to soldiers, if we all refuse to go into places of war, then we're making a statement. To you, that statement is a rejection of sin. But I fear that most of our people will understand you to be saying that God cannot be in dark places. When I read the passion on Good Friday this year, it looked and sounded a lot like combat to me. So, I'm not sure I'm ready to say that God cannot be in these terrible places. In fact, I have based my entire life on the hope that God can...and God IS in our terrible places, is found in the depth of our sin, and is present with us, even in our places of war. I have spent my life acting in faith and trust that God is in these dark places...but to say that God is not? Well, to me that places a limit on God's incarnation in Jesus. In other words, it limits God's reach. If there's something worse than war, then it must be the idea that God is content to abandon us to our war. I will not believe that about the God I serve. That's how I can hold the paradox...that's how I am able to serve in the National Guard with integrity."

It is a paradox that we hold as people of faith: to be part of the world, to witness with horror the violence all around us, and to hold out the message of God's hope and love in response. It seems crazy to resist the fear and hold to a faith which points us to new life, even in the midst of death.

But we do not worship a limited God. We do not believe that there is a place that God cannot be. We do not accept that there is a situation beyond God's promise of redemption. Even now, with all the bad news of this last month, still we proclaim: God IS. God is HERE. God is NOW. Let the words of our mouths, the actions of our bodies, and the mediation of our hearts proclaim that message of Good News into all the dark places, so that God's kingdom may come...and so that we might be witnesses to God's redeeming promises, yet again. Amen

Epiphany Summer Reading Group

Led by Heather Feltman

The books chosen for this summer allow us to reflect on how we might recognize and experience God in our everyday lives. At our last gathering on **Thursday, August 11, 7:00 p.m.**, we'll discuss our last two books.

Small Victories: Spotting Improbable Moments of Grace by Anne Lamott

Anne Lamott writes about faith, family, and community in essays that are irreverent and wise. In this book she offers a message of hope that celebrates the triumph of light over the darkness in our lives. Our victories over hardship and pain may seem small, she notes, but they change us—our perceptions and our perspectives. Lamott writes of forgiveness, restoration, and transformation, how we can turn toward love even in the most hopeless situations, how we find meaning in getting lost and amazement each time we are finally found! Profound and hilarious, these stories remind us that the human spirit is irrepressible.

Memories of God by Roberta Bondi

This book was created from stories Roberta formed through a life of prayer. In each chapter Bondi reflects on one of Christianity's central teachings, interweaving profound theological thought with personal stories. There is much in this small book, though she emphasizes three main themes. The first is around what it means to be made in the image of God. Her comment on her realization that "I, as a woman – neither as a defective male nor as a generic human being, but as a woman – am made in the image of God.", radically changed her perspective on all that consciously and unconsciously she had taken on board since childhood. The second is about how we relate to God. She explores what damage is done to our relationship with God when we believe (as is so often taught) that God loves us in spite of who we are, not because of who we are. And thirdly, in a church culture where rational thought is valued, recognizing that true rational thought can only be rational if it is loving, because the God who made us and gave us our minds is a God of love!

Father's Divine Love Ministries Poultry Project Update

Thanks for your generosity!! Challenge Match Achieved & Goal Exceeded

Accounting was done on Epiphany's Father's Divine Love Ministries Poultry Project fundraising effort. Over \$18,000 was donated.

What an outpouring of generosity! Thank you for your support. A special thanks goes to the family who challenged us! Below is a quote from Pastor David upon hearing about the fundraising results:

"Wow, God is so amazing! The whole building phase cost? Oh me of little faith. Please Paul, thank everyone who has chipped in and the entire Epiphany family which has so loved us. Thank you, Thank you, Thank you. ..! will keep a Facebook inventory of the progress as soon as funds hit this end. Much Love and gratitude from us. David"

With the goal reached, David and Sarah, their staff and volunteers will be able to complete phase II, construction of the poultry building. It will house 10,000 hens, 10,000 chicks and thousands of eggs. Here are several pictures of their progress.





Once fully in production, the Poultry Project will:

- Provide FDLM consistent income through the sale of chickens and eggs
- Give orphans, caregivers and community nutritional high protein meals
- Assist FDLM orphan costs for medical care and school tuitions
- Create jobs for adults & daily tasks for children impacting the dependence syndrome

FDLM (<u>www.dignityforafrica.ora</u>) in Jinja, Uganda, is an orphanage led by Pastor David Livingstone Zijjan and his wife Sarah. We are proud to support this ministry focusing on children orphaned by the HIV/AIDS epidemic. Epiphany Outreach teams have visited FDLM twice. David and Sarah have visited Epiphany on a number of occasions.

Any additional funds donated will be used by FDLM to pay tuition costs for children and young adults.



Portugal has lots of old churches with 95 percent being Roman Catholic.


Piety is stronger in the north.. An estimated 70 percent of Portuguese women are named Maria.
