#### **From Pastor Holmes:**

We often us the phrase "proclaim the Good News" without truly thinking about where it came from and what it means to us. In a post-resurrection time, the early church was in the midst of turmoil. Herod unleashed violent persecution on the church. James was killed and Peter was imprisoned. After being miraculously freed, Peter rejoined the remaining disciples and then journeyed to Caesarea. Meantime, the church in Antioch was sending our Saul and Barnabas on a missionary journey. It's during this first journey that Saul becomes widely known as Paul.

What does this common phrase/charge me to you?

I would encourage all of us to think of broadening our use of this phrase in a number of ways. Although the most common way we think of using it is through the spoken word – exhortation, think about the other ways you can "proclaim" your faith: how you treat a stranger in need of help, the way you greet someone for the first time, the consistent ways you interact with loved ones or friends, or how you deal with a sudden change in things (an emergency, a surprise, a change in an event).

## October 18 Adult Forum Speaker - Peter Soulen

Peter Soulen, a ruling elder from Westminster Presbyterian Church and chair of the Presbytery's Bills & Overture Committee, will be our guest speaker on Sunday, October 18. He is specifically coming to talk about the history and actions of the PCUSA's 221<sup>st</sup> General Assembly that approved Amendment 14-F, which was later affirmed by a majority of the 172 presbyteries (121 Yes; 47 No; 1 No Action; 1 Not Reporting)), what is commonly known as the "Marriage Amendment." It has been a source of much conversation and confusion, but it is an issue we need to learn about as the Session discerns what the policy will be for PPC.


