Alzheimer's disease and related dementias have a slow and relentless progression lasting on average 6-12 years from diagnosis. Caregivers are required to adapt and change as care needs increase. This year's conference focuses on learning to identify the specific markers indicative of disease progression along with the importance of early planning for the changes that lie ahead.

You will learn why the neuropsychiatric exam is important to staging the disease, with a tool provided to help families make informed decisions in response to changes. This will follow with a presentation on understanding the mental competence and legal issues involved when the diagnosis is a dementia.

The care of older adults and the caregivers of the LGBT community face psychosocial, cultural and economic issues. Learn how the LGBT Aging Project is addressing many of these unique situations by building models for strong programmatic initiatives.

The day concludes with a special program from the Memory Bridge Foundation. "Love is Listening" addresses ending the emotional isolation of Alzheimer's through learning how to be with someone whose need to give and receive love has not disappeared.
