Emily Hayes of Fond du Lac has been a full-time instructor for only two years at Moraine Park but has already made a huge impact on the students she teaches. In fact, she recently won the Outstanding New Instructor award from the Wisconsin Association for Career and Technical Education.

writing instructor at the College, she is a Sunday school teacher at her church and teaches a group cycling class
at the YMCA in Fond du Lac. Additionally, she and her husband serve as co-treasurers for the Roberts Elementary
PTO, as well as serve on the parent advisory committee for the Marian Early Childhood Center.

Through Moraine Park, Hayes says she is privileged to be part of the Northeast Wisconsin Educational Resource Alliance (NEW ERA) Faculty Dialog group, which brings together representatives from the 12 NEW ERA education institutions in Northeast Wisconsin.
