Joanne Macri

Stephanie Batcheller is a Backup Center Staff Attorney. She has been a career defender for more than thirty years, with extensive trial and appellate litigation experience in state and federal courts in Georgia, Maryland and New York.

Mariko Hirose is a staff attorney at the New York Civil Liberties Union (NYCLU), where she focuses on statewide civil rights and civil liberties impact litigation. At the NYCLU, she has worked on cases involving free speech, privacy, government transparency, criminal justice, and gender and sexual orientation discrimination. Prior to joining the NYCLU, Hirose was an associate at Outten & Golden LLP, where she represented employees in class action sex discrimination and wage-and-hour cases. She was also the William J. Brennan fellow at the American Civil Liberties Union,

where she litigated cases raising free speech and privacy issues. Hirose graduated *magna cum laude* from Yale University in 2003 and with Order of the Coif from Stanford Law School in 2008, where she was an articles editor for the Stanford Law Review. After law school, she clerked for the Honorable Stephen Reinhardt of the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit.

David J. Klem is a Supervising Attorney at the Center for Appellate Litigation. For nine years, he taught and ran the Federal Defender Clinic at NYU School of Law and prior to that taught legal research and writing at Brooklyn Law School. He clerked for United States District Court Judge Raymond J. Deane in the Eastern District of New York and was the "death clerk" for the New Jersey Supreme Court and Justice Alan B. Handler. A *cum laude* graduate of NYU Law School, with 17 years of appellate defense experience, he has briefed and argued over 200 cases in New York's intermediate appellate courts and a dozen cases in the New York Court of Appeals. David runs the plea project at the Center for Appellate Litigation and coordinates the office's habeas practice.

Joanne Macri – Prior to joining the NYS Office of Indigent Legal Services as the Regional Director, Ms. Macri served as the director of the Criminal Defense Immigration Project (CDIP) and the Immigrant Defense Project of the New York State Defenders Association (NYSDA). Ms. Macri was recognized by the New York State Bar Association Criminal Justice Section for her Outstanding Contribution to Criminal Law Education. Ms. Macri is also a Fellow of the New York Bar Foundation and has served as an adjunct professor at the State of New York University at Buffalo Law School where she has taught immigration law, immigration law practice and criminal/immigration law. Ms. Macri is also currently serving as the co-chair of the NYSBA Special Committee on Immigration Representation and has previously served on the NYSBA Immigration Litigation Committee, the New York City Bar Association Criminal Justice Operations Committee and the Western New York American Immigration Lawyers Association Chapter Subcommittee on Immigration and Customs Enforcement and Customs and Border Protection.

Jill Paperno is the second assistant public defender in the Monroe County Public Defender's Office. Jill graduated from SUNY Albany in 1981 and Buffalo Law School in 1984. She has worked for the Monroe County Public Defender's Office since 1987. She trained and supervised attorneys in the City Court and Parole sections of the office for ten years as the City Court Supervisor, and since 2009 has supervised

felony staff as the Second Assistant Public Defender. She has represented defendants in numerous felony jury trials, including homicides and sex offenses. Ms. Paperno assisted in developing the training program for Monroe County Public Defender's Office staff attorneys, and has presented CLEs on a variety of topics over the years. In 2010 she was awarded the Jeffrey A. Jacobs Memorial Award for outstanding trial work. In 2011 she was named a Rochester Daily Record Leader in Law and awarded the Rochester Daily Record Nathaniel Award. Jill contributed a chapter on handling sex offenses in *Strategies for Handling Sex Crimes*. She is a frequent blogger at <http://www.nyorkcriminaldefense.blogspot.com>. Her book, *Representing the Accused: A Practical Guide to Criminal Defense* was published in 2012 by West Publishing.

Allison D. Redlich is Associate Professor in the School of Criminal Justice at the State University of New York, University at Albany, and Chair of the Michael J. Hindelang Criminal Justice Research Center. Prior, she was a Senior Research Associate at Policy Research Associates and a Research Scientist at the Stanford University School of Medicine. She received her PhD in Developmental Psychology from the University of California, Davis. Professor Redlich is an internationally recognized expert on police interrogations and false confessions, often being asked to present her research abroad and in courts as an expert witness. Professor Redlich also has extensive programs of research on true and false guilty pleas and mental health courts. She has authored more than 75 articles and chapters, including (with J. Acker) the case law book, *Wrongful Convictions: Law, Social Science, and Policy*. Professor Redlich is a member of the Advisory Board of the Center on Wrongful Convictions of Youth, and is active in the American Psychological Association, including serving on the Executive Committees of the American Psychology-Law Society and the Society for Child and Family Practice and Policy.

Joshua Stubbe graduated from the University of Nebraska College of Law in 2000. He has worked at the Monroe County Public Defender's Office since 2002. Mr. Stubbe is a Special Assistant Public Defender and Assistant Town Court Supervisor. His caseload has consisted of violent felonies and high level drug cases since 2007, and he has conducted more than forty felony trials. As an experienced trial attorney, Mr. Stubbe frequently assists in training the newer attorneys in the Public Defender's Office. Outside of the office, Mr. Stubbe is a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of Ceva Theatre where he serves as the Co-Chair of the Education Committee.
