Empowering People

Mr Biagi opened his speech by focusing on why he believes the Community Empowerment Bill, Community Planning and engagement with people will help shape the integration of health and social care and allow communities across Scotland the opportunity to excel and take responsibility for their own health and wellbeing.

In his speech, Mr Biagi said “we want to help create a culture of expectation around community empowerment. Legislation and the establishment of the new Integrated Joint Boards will not fix everything, but they can help with the creation of a culture in which community empowerment and a focus on improving outcomes and reducing inequalities on our communities is the right thing to do”.

Integration: How Far Have We Really Come?

During the afternoon session, Shona Robison, Cabinet Secretary for Health, Wellbeing and Sport, described integration as a significant opportunity to shape our health and social care services for the better. Reflecting on her life as a Care Manager, Ms Robison talked about the need to bring together services and people to improve the whole pathway of care and said “I want every partnership to be bold and ambitious and ask the question - why not at home”.

She also focused on data for health and social care and advised that in any year, 2% of the population account for 50% of hospital and prescribing resource use. The same 2% of the population account for three quarters of unscheduled bed days in Scotland - that’s just over 100,000 people using three quarters of all unscheduled bed days.

She went on to say “if our localities and partnerships can understand the pathways of care experiences by the 2% of our population, they should be better placed to redesign the pathways to proactively plan their care. This, for me, is evidence that we all have much more to do to improve preventative and anticipatory care.”
