#### WE AS CHRISTIANS NEED TO BE A PRESENCE

Recently I went to Washington D.C. and participated for the first time in the 42nd Annual National March for Life. Under sunny skies there was a gathering on the National Mall of various speakers. Afterwards 600,000 of us marched down Constitution Avenue and concluded at the steps of the Supreme Court. Probably the most surprising thing was the majority of those marching were young people.

Part of the experience was also attending the LCMS Life Conference under the theme "It's Your Time to Stand." We heard various speakers; one of them that I really appreciated was Tim Goeglein. He had worked on the staff of President G.W. Bush and is presently the vice-president with FOCUS ON THE FAMILY and a member of an LCMS church. The title of his presentation was "Free to be Faithful."

He began by asking a couple of questions: Where do your rights come from? How do you lose your rights? He stated that our rights come from God, not the government and in this country we will lose our rights if we don't stand up for them. He went on to say that we can't have liberty and freedom without moral excellence in our leaders and our people. Government, regardless of how tolerable it is, cannot improve moral excellence. Moral excellence does not come from above – it wells up from the people.

The Christian church was bold to help abolish slavery and civil rights. The church needs to remain bold in its pro-life effort. As Goeglein stated: "Untruth is coming! It is already here! We have to change the culture and change the law" concerning abortion. The unborn have a right to live.

Goeglein encouraged those gathered to look at Jesus and see Him as wanting us as Christians and as a Christian church to be bold. Jesus said, "Let your light shine." He concluded by stating: "We need to be a presence."

### Across My Desk: DJ Schult

The below is a devotion posted by Dale Meyer, President of St. Louis Seminary on Monday January 26, 2015. He speaks to engaging our culture, a critical task for our NWD churches.

Congratulations to Coach Mike Krzyzewski on winning his 1000<sup>th</sup> NCAA Division 1 men's basketball game. Immediately after the game, a Fox Sports reporter asked, "How have you changed over the years you've coached?" "I've changed a lot," Krzyzewski said. "You have to change with the culture of the kids you're privileged to coach."

Himself a Baby Boomer, Krzyzewski in 40 years has coached players from the Baby Boom (1946-1964), Gen-X (1965-1979), and Millennial (1980-2000) generations. He knows that each generation of young people has its own peculiarities. You know it too. They're our generation's children, not our clones.

When church people talk about responding to generational and cultural changes, there are always a dependable few quick to speak but slow to hear (cf. James 1:19) who jump to the conclusion that being sensitive to culture means accommodation to culture. That's not necessarily true. In the 1950's, it took 20 church members a year to reach one person for Jesus Christ. Today it takes 85 (Thom Rainer). That suggests to me the problem isn't accommodation as much as church members' failure to listen. Krzyzewski says it's a privilege to coach young adults and we should consider it a privilege to get out of our old comfort zones and listen to them. "Meet them where they're at, but don't leave them there."



#### Reporting the Cost of CHP on Workers' Form W-2s

Concordia Plan Services (CPS) wants to remind employers\* in the Concordia Health Plan (CHP) they are still exempt from the IRS requirement of having to report the cost of employer-sponsored health coverage on each worker's Form W-2.

On March 29, 2011, the IRS released Notice 2011-28 exempting employers that provide coverage through a self-funded church health plan, such as the CHP, from the requirement to report the cost of health coverage. (Other W-2 reporting obligations continue to apply.) This exemption was reaffirmed in IRS Notice 2012-9.

The IRS notice suggests that some of the exemptions provided may be transitional. However, CPS will continue to monitor IRS guidance and share information with you as it becomes available. The IRS has stated it will provide at least a six-month notice if a determination is made requiring employers with denominational plans to start reporting this information on Form W-2s.

\*The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod employers that offer health plans other than the CHP may not be eligible for the exemption from reporting the cost of health coverage, and should check with their health plan carrier or review IRS Notice 2012-9 to determine whether an exemption is applicable.

#### Counselor Corner

#### ADDRESSING ANGER

Anger is a real and common emotion. It is often defended by such statements as "Jerry has a short-fuse," or, "Sometimes Jim just blows up!" However, understanding anger is not that simple.

Oftentimes, anger is a secondary emotion. Unresolved restlessness and fear often precede the expression of anger. It is these underlying issues that need attention in order to effectively address the anger. Some of the other triggering, "dark" emotions can be guilt, shame, and loneliness.

By way of example, we can picture anger as molten lava in a volcano. The underlying heat source below the lava triggers the "anger flow" when these forces get heated up. If a person fears inadequacy, but this is not addressed, the outcome can be the expression of anger. The anger is a visible force, but its source is hidden, yet powerful.

Another common cause for anger is when a person's expectations do not match reality. Said differently, the distance between one's expectations and reality defines the intensity of the anger. Words like "frustration" are also used to define this experience.

From a spiritual perspective, anger is evidence of a lack of self control (the latter being a "fruit of the Spirit" (Galatians 5:22-23)). In this same section, the apostle Paul lists anger under the "works of the flesh" (vss. 19-20). Yes, anger is a spiritual issue, in addition to its emotional side. Paul goes on to say this in his letter to the Ephesians—

"Be angry and do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, and give no opportunity to the devil." (26-27)

The apostle James shares this reality, "for the anger of man does not produce the righteousness that God requires" (1:20). The author is quick to point to the remedy, in meekness the individual is to allow the word of God to be implanted (vs. 21).

God is well aware of our potential for anger. He shares this emotion, but always with controlled righteousness. Through His Spirit, we too can address the anger within us, and be victorious—all to God's glory. Willingness to confess the full nature of one's inner battles is also a vital tool in this spiritual victory.
