Our Successful Annual Giving Campaign Closes on February 8

On behalf of my fellow members of the Annual Giving Team and of the Vestry, a big **THANK YOU** to all who completed and are contemplating completing pledge cards for 2015!

As you can see from the chart depicted below, our annual pledges for EEC increased over \$40,000 this year from 2014 and we exceeded our goals for total number of pledges (116) and number of 'new' pledges (31). As such, the Vestry was able (thanks in large part to those pledging and the sharpened pencils of our Finance Committee team) to approve a near break-even budget for 2015 for the first time in years — one which includes nice increases for Adult and Children Christian Education, an additional staff member for the nursery on Sundays, and a needed boost for our Outreach efforts. We even increased Emmanuel's pledge to the Diocese of Virginia by over 10 percent this year from 2014!

you provide throughout the year to help others in our community and in Haiti, we're doing just that! We've got a good thing going at EEC and look forward, with God's blessing, to the continued growth of our family of faith.




Why We Chose Emmanuel


Adult Spiritual Formation


The forums will be led by your clergy: Joani and Chuck, as well as Emmanuel's two seminarians: Alex and Scott.

the Messiah and the importance of a theology of the Cross. An indispensible guide to the shortest Gospel written for a general audience."


"Maverick Mark: An Untamed First Gospel", Bonnie B Thurston, 2013, 99 pp

> radicalism of Mark's message by focusing on discipleship, social justice and personal lifestyle."

"Behold God's Son: Encountering Christ in the Gospel of Mark", Christoph Schonborn, 2007, 238 pp

"Emphasizes the unique voice of the Evangelist Mark, highlighting that no other Gospel speaks in such a human way about Jesus. Anger and sorrow, Jesus's passionate emotional responses strongly portray the humanity of Jesus. Believing in Jesus Christ, having faith in him as God made man, is the good news according to Mark."



"Binding the Strong Man: A Political Reading of Mark's Story of Jesus", Ched Myers, 1988, 500 pp

"Insisting on fidelity to both text and context, Myers reads Mark's narrative of Jesus' life and Messianic practice first against the historical circumstances of first century Palestine, and then against the backdrop of contemporary oppression and violence. Mark's Jesus, Myers argues, offers a compelling model of a Christian practice of non-violent resistance to social economic, and political domination."

2015 Diocesan Council

Chuck, Barbie Frank (as alternate delegate) and I (as Emmanuel's appointed delegate) represented Emmanuel at the 220th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, which took place in Richmond January 22-24. Also present were our three bishops, all the Diocesan staff, and clergy and lay representatives of the 182 churches in the Diocese. A number of other organizations also sent representatives, including Shrine Mont, the Episcopal schools in the diocese, Virginia Theological Seminary, the "Grace Inside" ministry of prison chaplains, and many others. As Bishop Shannon said, "It's a good time to be an Episcopalian!" We found the atmosphere positive and dynamic. The workshops and speakers (particularly the "Stories of the Diocese") were informative and inspirational. It was wonderful to connect with other churches in our diocese, and feel part of a larger and cohesive effort to build the kingdom of God. The Season of Lent

The Great Litany & The Penitential Order: Sunday Worship in the Season of Lent

As we enter the liturgical season of Lent, the color, mood, and prayers of our Sunday worship are about to change as we walk these 40 days. The church hangings will turn to penitential purple. The flowers will disappear from the altar, replaced by simple greens. Lent is a time of prayerful reflection and honest



introspection before God. If you are a long-time Episcopalian these traditions may be familiar to you but if you are new to the Anglican tradition probably not. So here is a brief intro to the special prayers we will be using in our Sunday worship as we walk with Christ to Calvary.

The Great Litany (BCP, p 148) is a call and response prayer of petition and confession. Led by a deacon, it's use dates back to the 5th century in Rome. For Anglicans, the Great Litany holds a special place in our history. It was the first English rite translated by Archbishop of Canterbury, Thomas Cranmer. Published in 1544 it precedes even the first Book of Common Prayer of 1549. Henry VIII ordered it to be sung in procession in the streets of London during the time of war with Scotland and France. Versions of the litany have been included in every English Prayer Book since. The 1979 BCP gave it it's name: "The Great Litany" to distinguish it from "lesser litanies" in the Prayer Book.

Because of its reverent and penitential tone, it is traditionally used the **first Sunday in Lent.** Said or sung, often in procession by a cantor, the choir, and the congregation, the Great Litany is the entrance rite to the Eucharist. The litany echoes the prayers of the

faithful through the centuries and includes an invocation of the Trinity, prayers for deliverance from "evil, spiritual harm, and natural calamities" prayers for forgiveness invoked by the power of Christ's life, death and resurrection, along with prayers for the church, the world, prisoners, the sick and all in our daily life and work. When used as the entrance rite, The Great Litany replaces both the Prayers of the People and the Confession, as well as the opening hymn.

Each subsequent Sunday in Lent, our worship will begin with **The Penitential Order (BCP, p 351)**. Opening with the acclamation: "Bless the Lord, who forgives all our sins.", together we recite The Ten Commandments (The Decalogue) as we pray for God's help to incline our hearts to keep them. The rite concludes with confession and absolution.



Stations of the Cross

Friday's during Lent at 7:30 p.m.

The Stations of the Cross refers to a devotional depiction of the final hours of Christ. It may be done at any time, but is most commonly done during the Season of Lent, especially on Good Friday and on Friday evenings during



Lent. The object of the Stations is to help the faithful to make a spiritual pilgrimage of prayer to the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death.

images of stories about the Passion and death of Jesus

Christ. Of the fourteen stations, eight are based on events recorded in the Gospels.

The route traditionally held to have been taken by Jesus to his death at Calvary (Golgotha) in Jerusalem is called the Via Dolorosa or the Sorrowful Way. A very early tradition developed in the Holy Land to follow the Via Dolorosa, stopping and contemplating the events of Christ's Passion at sites where tradition held that they took place. European Christians on Pilgrimage to the Holy Lands brought back the custom of remembering the Passion through various devotions as early as the 4th century.

Most trace the beginning of these devotions to Saint Francis of Assisi or his followers in the thirteenth century. During times when the occupation of the Holy Lands made Christian pilgrimage especially difficult or dangerous, the Stations were erected in the local churches as a way of bringing Jerusalem to the people.

Please join us at 7:30 p.m. Fridays during Lent at Emmanuel to travel The Way of our Lord Jesus Christ.


Registration for Shrine Mont Camps is Open!



January and February are busy, busy months for the preschool as we wrapped up our Open House in January and conduct our Lottery on Wednesday, February 4. Our Open House was a success, and we had wonderful help from teachers and parents, as our tour guides. February is filled with professional development exposure for faculty and staff. Such a great way for teachers to continue their own learning, refresh their ideas, and invigorate their approaches.

On Thursday, February 19, we have an enrichment assembly for the preschoolers, called *Sunny and Licorice*, a play about friendship designed for 2-5 year olds. The production is put on by <u>Arts on the Horizon</u>, a local non-profit theatre company focusing on performances and educational programs for children ages 0 to 6.

Red Two's Classroom Highlight

The Red Twos classroom is the youngest group at EPS. Every Thursday and Friday, we provide routines and structure that allow the students to grow and learn while feeling safe and comfortable. Students are given daily opportunities to explore and learn through age-appropriate toys and projects. Children are encouraged to use their words to express their needs and wants. The activities in the Red Two's classroom are developed to create social and learning experiences through play, projects, and activities. For the month of February we will continue our Winter theme. We will reinforce our learning
