Deep Into the Season of Lent

Here at Emmanuel we are deep into the beautiful Season of Lent. As you know, Lent is a solemn religious observance in the liturgical calendar of many Christian denominations that begins on Ash Wednesday and covers a period of approximately 40 days before Easter Sunday. The traditional purpose of Lent is the preparation of the believer through prayer, penance,

repentance of sins, almsgiving and self-denial.

The customary purpose of Lent is heightened in the annual commemoration of Holy Week, marking the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus, which recalls the tradition and events of the New Testament beginning on Maundy Thursday and culminating in the joyful celebration of Easter Sunday. During Lent many folks commit to



fasting or giving up certain types of luxuries as a form of penitence. Other Christians add a Lenten spiritual discipline, such as reading a daily devotional to draw themselves near to God (page 6). The Way of the Cross is a devotional commemorating Christ's carrying His cross and of His crucifixion (page 7). Please note that Region IV has a Lenten Series (page 6). Join us on Sunday mornings to discuss the Gospel of Mark (page 6). Mark your calendars so as to not miss the Triduum (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the Great Easter Vigil on Saturday) (page 7).

Spotlight on our Long-Time Members



March Greetings to all of our EEC Families!

Spring is coming! I promise! In the meantime, I hope that you are all able to enjoy the last few weeks before King Winter marches out of here. (*Sniff*)

A couple of weeks ago, I had the pleasure of hearing practical theologian and professor, Dr. Joyce Mercer, who teaches at Virginia Theological Seminary, speak on the topic "Raising Children in a Consumer Culture." It was a fabulous talk and highlighted many important things we as parents can do for our children's faith formation and for keeping our families centered on the things that matter. I won't relay the whole talk here, but two big takeaways for me were:

- The way we spend our time, money, and activity are all deeply theological matters because they are about the ways we commit our lives to each other.
- There are five things we can do as families to ground our children (and us!) spiritually as we tend to time, money, and activity: a) eat meals together; b) create device-free zones; c) talk about how and why we make decisions about purchases; d) allow simple rituals to provide a pattern and structure to our children's lives, e.g., lighting a candle together, table grace or song, family meetings complete with highs, lows and maybe a family game, and bedtime rituals, and finally; e) sort out the things competing for our time and energy, making a flexible plan to be able to meet everyone's needs and still have time for what is important to our family and for church.

If enough people are interested in unlocking what all of this means, I know that Dr. Mercer would be very happy to come to Emmanuel to share her insights. Please <u>contact me</u> if you would like for me to set up a time for her to come. If even five families express an interest, it would be worthwhile to have her come.

On another note, thank you to those who took the time to attend our Town Hall meeting and respond to our survey on faith formation programs for our children and youth. We are gathering the information you submitted and will be sure to take everyone's responses into account as we make decisions for next year. Stay tuned!

In the meantime, I pray that you are able to take time to breathe as a family and take time for the things that matter most to you. If you haven't had those opportunities, Lent is a great time for inward reflection and renewal AND spring is coming and that is always a good time for a fresh start! Read on for more information about upcoming events!

May you have a blessed Lent.



The Adult Spiritual Formation Team has chosen not one, but two daily Lenten devotionals.





Services During Lent and Holy Week

The Way of the Cross March 6, 13, 20 & 27—7:30 p.m.



The Way of the Cross has been a part of the Church's Lenten devotions for centuries. This devotion originated from the processions made by

These processions wound through the city to the traditional sites of Jesus' path as he carried the Cross to Golgotha. Many of these sites, along what is now the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem, are described in the Passion Narratives of the Four Gospels. Eight of these "stations" or stops along the way are directly from these narratives. The remaining six traditional stations are based on inferences from the Gospel tradition and legend. The form that the Episcopal Church uses is found in our Book of Occasional Services using various Scripture texts.

Maundy Thursday

April 2 — 7:30 p.m.

Maundy Thursday is the traditional English name for Thursday of Holy Week, so named because it is considered the anniversary of the institution of the Eucharist by Jesus at the Last Supper and His washing of the disciples' feet.


Washing feet was a job reserved for the lowest servant in the house. Yet our

Lord of Lords humbled himself to wash His disciples' feet. Jesus' washing of the disciples' feet is symbolically reenacted and the altars are stripped bare until The Great Vigil of Easter Service.

Good Friday

April 3 — 12:00 noon and 7:30 p.m.

Good Friday commemorates the crucifixion and death of Jesus. Good Friday along with Ash Wednesday are two designated fast days in the Anglican calendar. The Episcopal Church is a part of the Anglican calendar, culture, church and



traditions. Good Friday is more than an historical event, it also stands for the self-offering of Christ for us, the apex of Christ's sacrificial life.

The Great Vigil of Easter

April 4 — 7:30 p.m.

Holy Saturday is the final day of Holy Week, the final day of the traditional 40 day Lenten fast. Please stay tuned as we work out the details of the beautiful and highly symbolic Great Vigil of Easter, and please do plan to celebrate with us.

Easter Sunday

April 5 — 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.

Easter is about Jesus rising from the dead when Christians the world over celebrate His resurrection. Jesus' bodily coming to life again stands at the

center of the Gospel. All four gospels speak of it and the creeds affirm it. This is a period of much joy emphasizing the teachings of Jesus during His post-resurrection appearances. This is a time of feasting and celebration. The long fast of Lent is over. Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!

Mental Health First Aid Training

More people deal with a mental health issue than heart disease and cancer combined — approximately 20% of us. 50% of us will deal with a mental health issue in our lifetimes. Emphasis on "us": mental illness is no respecter of persons. Because of stigma, 60% of people



living with a mental illness never receive any treatment. Mental illness left untreated can be a deadly disease.

Mental Health First Aid is a valuable skill for all to learn. Like traditional First Aid Training or CPR, MHFAT develops skills to recognize, engage, and assist those developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis to get

the professional help they need.

Led by the Alexandria Department of Community and Human Services, the training demonstrates the initial help given to a person showing signs of mental illness or a mental health crisis. The 8-hour course teaches risk factors, warning signs and symptoms of mental health and substance use disorders; the effects of the illnesses and an overview of treatments; and a five-step action plan for helping someone with symptoms.

This training does not prepare someone to diagnose or provide treatment. It is designed to help paraprofessionals and laypersons provide support until an individual is linked to professional resources. MHFA is not recommended for licensed mental health providers.

Attendees of the full 8-hour course will receive a three-year certification in MHFA. <u>Click here</u> for more information about MHFA. The training is offered throughout the year. <u>Click here</u> for class schedule and registration.

Sponsored by the Friends of the Alexandria Mental Health Center and the City of Alexandria, the course is offered free of charge.

Unhinged: True Tales of Living with Mental Illness

I am a woman with a storied past. On my blog, UnorthodoxUnhinged.com, I tell stories weekly — stories of a "manic Christian". Ghost stories, bedtime stories, bible stories, camp fire stories, family stories, horror stories, funny stories, glory stories, and true stories of a bipolar and sometimes balanced life. I tell the truth, the God's honest truth and nothing but the truth one story at a time.

There is no better way to tell the truth than to tell a story.

Katie Kelly, a member of our parish, a new EEC vestry member, and former board member, introduced me to Amy Saidman, the executive director of SPEAKEASYDC. Amy and I met in September and we agreed — stories like mine need to be told. They need to be told live and on stage with a real audience up close and personal: A stage for people seldom seen. A

venue for voices rarely heard.



But not just me, I tell crazy stories so others can too.

According to the National Alliance on

Mental Illness, one in four adults — approximately 61.5 million Americans experience mental illness in a given year. Approximately 20% of youth ages 13 -18 experience severe mental disorders in a given year and approximately 13% for ages 8 -13. Despite the profound impact that mental illness has on so many individuals, families, and communities it remains misunderstood and taboo.

This is about all of us. All of God's children have a story to tell.

So coming to a stage near you, right here at Emmanuel on High, at 8:00 p.m., on Saturday, April 25, I am proud to present:

Unhinged: True Tales of Living with Mental Illness

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Produced by SPEAKEASYDC, called "the gold standard in storytelling" by the Washington Post, *Unhinged* will feature eight masterly crafted true stories on the theme of living with a mental illness, loving someone with a mental illness, or working in the field.

In February, we had a wonderful Enrichment Assembly, where the Arts on the Horizon cast visited to put on their performance of Sunny and Licorice. "Sunny, the zoo's sole orangutan, is delighted to get a new roommate, but things don't go smoothly when Licorice first arrives. Sunny likes to be loud, but Licorice prefers to read the newspaper. Easter Egg Hunt




We invite all children to participate in the annual Easter Egg Hunt on Easter Sunday, April 5. The hunt will start about 15 minutes after the conclusion of the
