Biblical Text

²¹ Then Jesus left Galilee and went north to the region of Tyre and Sidon. ²² A Gentile* woman who lived there came to him, pleading, "Have mercy on me, O Lord, Son of David! For my daughter is possessed by a demon that torments her severely." 23 But Jesus gave her no reply, not even a word.

Biblical Text

 Then his disciples urged him to send her away. "Tell her to go away," they said. "She is bothering us with all her begging." ²⁴ Then Jesus said to the woman, "I was sent only to help God's lost sheep—the people of Israel." 25 But she came and worshiped him, pleading again, "Lord, help me!"

Biblical Text

• ²⁶ Jesus responded, "It isn't right to take food from the children and throw it to the dogs." ²⁷ She replied, "That's true, Lord, but even dogs are allowed to eat the scraps that fall beneath their masters' table." 28 "Dear woman," Jesus said to her, "your faith is great. Your request is granted." And her daughter was instantly healed. (Mt 15:21-28 NLT)

Introduction

- Parallel passage is Mark 7:24-30
- Mark does not mention the disciples
- Mark does tell us that the woman was Greek (that is, non-Jew) and a Syrophoenician by birth
- Tyre and Sidon were on the coast of the Mediterranean Sea about 30 and 50 miles respectively from Galilee

- The Identity of the Woman
 - She was a Gentile (Hellenist) not necessarily a person of Greek origin
 - Syrophoencian by birth (Mark 7:26)
 - Matthew uses the term "Canaanite"
 - The Canaanites were the traditional enemies of Israel in the OT
 - The Jews greatly hated the Canaanites

- The Identity of the Woman
 - Jesus had healed other Gentiles
 - In Galilee people from as far as Syria came to be healed (Mt 4:23–25)
 - In Capernaum a Roman officer had a sick servant (Mt 8:5–13)
 - But now it is clear that Jesus was in pagan territory not in the nation of Israel
 - This created a great dilemma

- The Need of the woman
 - A pagan woman was asking the Jewish Messiah for a miracle
 - Her daughter was demonized
 - The girl was severely tormented
 - The mother was desperate to see her daughter healthy and whole

- The Attitude of the woman
 - She pleaded with Jesus
 - She asked for mercy
 - She called Jesus Lord
 - She called Jesus "Son of David"
 - It can mean a person who is descended from king David, or a Jew
 - It is a messianic title
 - This creates a great cultural tension

The Hearts of the Disciples

The disciples urged Jesus

 The disciples wanted Jesus to send her away

The disciples felt bothered

The Hearts of the Disciples

- The disciples urged Jesus
 - It was more than a simple request
 - It was a passionate plea
- The disciples wanted Jesus to send her away
 - The disciples were uncompassionate
 - The disciples were prejudiced probably because she was a foreigner

The Hearts of the Disciples

- The disciples felt bothered
 - Rather than to be sensitive to the needs of the woman, the disciples were annoyed by her insistence
 - So many times in ministry, we must guard our hearts from allowing our hearts to harden so much that we dismiss people and opportunities

Jesus did not reply to the woman

Jesus mentions his first priority

Jesus praises the woman

- Jesus did not reply to the woman
 - This is a somewhat strange behavior for Jesus in the Gospels
 - He may have been testing the woman
 - The woman was not going to receive no as an answer

- Jesus mentions his first priority
 - This concept is echoed by Paul in Romans "to the Jew first"
 - It is not an exclusion rather a first step
 - Salvation is through Israel in fulfillment of God's promise to Abraham but for the benefit of all the nations
 - Jesus is the Savior of the world not just Israel

- Jesus praises the woman
 - Jesus admires the faith of the woman
 - Jesus gives the woman her desire
 - The daughter was healed immediately
 - This miracle showed that God is the God of all peoples and His mercy endures forever
