## What's Happening out in The Grove this

# WINTER

### Early Winter:

- \* Muskrats huddle inside their lodges to keep warm
- \* Rabbits nibble twigs close to the ground
- \* White-tailed deer form winter groups
- \* Chickadees and nuthatches flock together and forage for food
- \* Coyote scat can be found marking trail crossings
- **\* Grey squirrels compete for mates**
- # Great-horned owls can be heard calling in the night
- \* Abandoned bird's nests are easily observed in the bare trees
- \* Raccoons begin their mating season
- \* The least weasel's brown summer coat turns white
- \* Sandhill cranes migrate and may be heard calling above

#### Mid Winter:

- \* White-tailed deer bucks lose their antlers in the woods
- **\*** Great horned owls nest high in the trees
- \* Hoarfrost coats leaves and grasses when temperatures drop rapidly
- \* Meadow vole trails can be seen through the snow in the prairies
- **\*** Cardinals dine communally at feeding stations
- \* Pinkish-red cottontail rabbit urine can be seen staining the snow
- \* Insect galls are easily seen on dried wildflower stems
- \* Foxes mate and ready their dens for young
- \* Lichens flourish on rocks, trees, benches and buildings
- \* Tracks of raccoons, deer, squirrel and mink can be seen in snow
- \* Maple sap begins to flow and form icicles on the tips of twigs

### Late Winter:

- \* The first squirrels of the year are born
- \* Coyotes begin their mating season
- \* Skunk cabbage appears near wetlands and depressions
- \* Red-bellied woodpeckers begin courtship activities
- ₩ Woodcocks migrate through the woods and prairies
- \*Young great-horned owls hatch and may be heard calling for food
- \* Flocks of cedar waxwings dine on dried fruit in the trees
- \* Turtles may be seen swimming beneath the ice in the pond
- \* Snow drops poke through the snow to bloom
- \* Skunks emerge from their dens to find mates
- \* Red-winged blackbirds begin arriving to establish territories
