#### **The Director's Report**

At the October Board Meeting, Steve Swanson shared architectural drawings and spoke enthusiastically for a 20' x 20' addition to The Grove Archives Building. Completed in 2005, the Archives Building serves as the repository of a huge collection of letters written by various members of the Kennicott family starting in the early 1800s; and, a wide variety of artifacts belonging to the family. There are some 5,500 photographs including many complete family albums. The collection also includes unpublished manuscripts and an original manuscript with unpublished portions.

Swanson stated that "few pioneer American families have such a wealth of comprehensive documentation that reflect nineteenth century America. Scholars and laymen alike are attracted to these materials and looking forward, it is time to expand our storage space so that we can be accepting of new materials." Funding for this important project has been received from the state of Illinois, the Glenview Park District and the Grove Heritage Association.

Archivist, Liz Kopp, concurs that space is exceptionally tight and she is looking forward to having more space to store and display these special materials.

Historical markers can now be found at various sites within The Grove. Each gives a few facts about a particular building or space and its importance in the development of The Grove. Several markers were gifts from the Grove Heritage Association. Two markers, Save The Grove and the Grove Heritage Association, were gifts from the Glenview Park District, in honor of the Grove Heritage Association's 40th anniversary.

#### **A Generous Donation to The Grove Archives**

Welcome readers. On August 24, 2014, The Grove received an incredible donation from the Peattie family—Dana Peattie VanderMey, her sister Hilary, their cousins and Dana and Hilary's uncle, Dr. Mark R. Peattie. As you may know, the Peatties came into the Kennicott family through Cora Kennicott, Dr. John Kennicott's younger daughter. Briefly, Cora was born on March 24, 1843, at The Grove. On January 28, 1863, Cora married a young lawyer named James Redfield. Together they had four children—Agnes, born in 1864, Grace born in 1866, Josephine born in 1868 and Robert, born on October 24, 1870. Robert Redfield may have been named after his famous uncle, Cora's brother, Robert Kennicott.

On February 5, 1896, Robert Redfield married the beautiful

Bertha Alexandra Dreier and they had two children—Robert II, born on December 4, 1897, and Louise, born on June 14, 1900. They lived in a home near the present location of the Redfield Estate. On May 23, 1923, Louise married famed author Donald Culross Peattie and they had a daughter, Celia Louise, and three sons, Malcolm Redfield Peattie, (the most beautiful little boy in the world, according to his grandmother, Bertha, and pictured right),



Mark Robert Peattie and Noel Roderick Peattie. Malcolm Peattie married Margaretta (Retta) Forbes on June 24, 1950, and they made their home in Santa Barbara, California. In time, they had two daughters, Dana and Hilary.

I had the privilege to sort through the donated box of treasures so I could make an inventory for The Grove and was struck by the enormous generosity of the family. They donated beautiful family photographs, including many of their greatgrandparents, Bertha and Robert (pictured below), pictures of their Danish ancestors, as well as a wonderful photograph of Dana and Hilary's father at age 3 (pictured above). As





you can see, he was indeed beautiful. There are also some superb photographs of their grandparents, writers Louise and Donald Peattie and Louise's brother, Robert.<sup>2</sup> We received birth certificates, college diplomas, death certificates, military documents and many newspaper clippings predominately about Donald and Louise Peattie's books, and items concerning Donald Peattie's parents: Elia Peattie and Robert Peattie, who were also noted authors. There are pictures of Louise and Donald's children in France, North Carolina and later in life. What a wonderful gift to The Grove.

One very interesting newspaper article concerns Elia Peattie's girlhood home<sup>3</sup> at 7660 South Shore Drive, in Chicago, Illinois. The article explains that Elia Peattie's father was Frederick Wilkinson, a Kalamazoo attorney who came to Chicago shortly after the Chicago fire in 1871. Mr. Wilkinson built his house in 1880 in the South Shore area. At the time, South Shore Drive was a dirt road called Bond Avenue. Their home was in an area called Cheltenham Beach and there were only five other houses in the vicinity. Mr. Wilkinson lived in the house with his wife and four daughters and they reared their girls with a "bookish" education. Elia became interested in writing and later she married another writer, Robert Peattie. Elia and Robert moved into her parents' house when the elder Wilkinsons returned to Michigan and Donald Culross Peattie was born there. Elia and Robert's children were reared in a "literary atmosphere," and author Drury writes that this made Donald Peattie a "poet of nature."

I would like to make special mention of Donald and Louise's son, Dr. Mark R. Peattie. As many of you may know, this wonderful man sadly passed away in January. Dr. Peattie was a noted scholar of Japanese history, a prolific author, important member of academia and a great friend to The Grove. Dr. Peattie remembered The Grove before his passing and asked his family to ensure that The Grove received the items he earmarked for us. In August, Dana brought these items to us and we are very, very grateful. Donations like this one are so important and so greatly appreciated. Generations are tied together through their documents and artifacts and these items fill in the gaps in Kennicott family history.

I would like to give one final thank you to the Peattie family. I just learned that they donated a bench to The Grove in

memory of all the Peatties who have passed away. This generous donation will allow our visitors to sit in a quiet place and enjoy nature like Donald Culross Peattie, Louise Redfield Peattie and their family did when they lived here at The Grove.

#### Do you recognize this man?



This man, with large mutton chops and pince nez glasses is the next unidentified person in our collection. I wonder what he is thinking as he looks away from the camera.

You will note that the photograph was taken by Gehrig at 337 West Madison in Chicago. Joseph W. Gehrig came to the United States from Switzerland when he was 3 years old. In 1887, Mr.

Gehrig based his business at 337 West Madison, meaning this photograph was taken after this date, and Mr. Gehrig stayed at this location until his retirement in 1905. According to the website Broadway Photographs, "Gehrig possessed several traits that endeared him to colleagues and employees. He was generous, given to praise, curious, and entirely lacking in temper. He loved to work and communicated his enthusiasms to everyone near him. He had a singular gift for intuiting talent in aspiring photographers." The website continues by adding that there are a few curiosities of style in Gehrig's portraits—foremost was his disinclination to have his sitters' eyes engage those of the viewer. Now I understand why our sitter is looking away from the camera!


Considering that 2014 marked the 100th Anniversary of the death of the last Passenger Pigeon worldwide, Steve Swanson and Judy Beck, former member of the Illinois Conservation Council and GHA board member, engaged two knowledgeable speakers from the Field Museum who are well acquainted with the topic of bird migration. He introduced

Ms. Peggy McNamara, artist in residence for the Field Museum, who spoke about her paintings which appear in the book, "The Art of Migration" written by John Bates and James Boone. The audience also heard from Dr. Douglas F. Stotz, conservation ecologist in the Environment, Culture and Conservation Division at the Field Museum who spoke on migration and breeding birds along the Chicago lakefront and other prime locations in the state. Both speakers were well received and all who attended found that they had gained a better understanding of what measures were being taken in Illinois to protect existing bird populations.
