## Libraries in Western MD Disappointed by Lack of Snow

According to WHILBR, Western MD's Historical Library, the 1897-1898 winter was another major letdown, especially for school-aged children, but not their parents. Snow totals across the region averaged only 243 inches that winter and news articles report that children only missed 10 days of school in Garrett County, 7 days in Allegany County, and 3 days in Washington County. He explains, "Usually I have till mid-May or early June before I have to start mowing every week, sometimes twice a week. Then there's the weed whacking and edging. And landscaping, don't even get me started on the landscaping."

"Snow covers everything, you know? It makes it all pretty and sparkly white. When there's no snow, I have to *make* the earth look pretty. I have to plant flowers, and mulch, and weed, and trim the trees. It's such a nuisance."
