February 8

From Osama to Obama: What Is to Be Done in the Middle East?

When Barack Obama moved into the Oval Office in January 2009, he vowed to reinvent U.S. foreign policy in the Middle East, scrapping George W. Bush's global war on terror, withdrawing from Iraq, and jumpstarting the Palestinian-Israeli peace process. Six years later, ISIS controls much of Syria, Gaza has become a charnel house, and American drones fill the skies from Pakistan to Yemen. What went wrong? And can Obama do anything to fix it?

Douglas Little is the Robert and Virginia Scotland Professor of History and International Relations at Clark University. The third edition of his most recent book, <u>American Orientalism: The United States and the Middle East since 1945</u> (University of North Carolina Press), appeared in 2008 and was translated into Arabic in 2010.

February 22

Irish Rebel. American Patriot

Progressive immigration, religious tolerance and freedom, innovations in social welfare, public health, and medical education, abolitionist, supporter of women's rights, rebel leader and practical politician, Dr. William James Macneven's life and teachings offer profound lessons for today's world problems. Randy Ingham will present some of the important insights of this great humanitarian, as they relate to these critical issues.

Randy Ingham's political activism in the 50s and 60s brought him into contact with such leaders as Martin Luther King, Jr. and Betty Friedan, and to the Peace Corps in India. He received honors for his 45 years providing services to people with social, substance abuse, and mental health problems.

March 8

LGBT Asylum Task Force

The violence resulting from homophobia and anti-homosexuality laws in many countries in the world is rampant. There are laws against homosexuality in 88 countries around the world. Pastor Judith Hanlon from the LGBT Asylum Support Task Force will speak about the support provided to those who are seeking political asylum in the U.S. based on their sexual orientation or gender identity. As of October 2014, the Task Force has helped more than 80 individuals. Volunteers contribute to the financial, housing, social, and spiritual needs of asylum seekers.

Pastor Judith Hanlon is minister at the Hadwen Park Congregational Church, a United Church of Christ congregation located on Clover Street in Worcester. Speaking with Pastor Judy will be two asylum seekers who have fled their home country because of fear for their safety.

March 22

Worcester Area Opioid Crisis

Sheriff Evangelidis has focused on education and prevention as the best way to keep our youth out of prison. He will talk about the rise in the use of opioid pain killers and heroin in Worcester County, a problem that has risen to crisis proportions. Heroin, once a drug only seen in poor urban neighborhoods, has moved dramatically into rural and suburban, middle class communities throughout Worcester County.

Lew Evangelidis was elected as Sheriff of Worcester County in 2010. Prior to this, he was a member of the Massachusetts House of Representatives for 8 years, a member of the Holden Board of Selectmen, an Assistant District Attorney in Suffolk County, a State Attorney in Dade County Florida and an assistant in the Dade County, Florida State Attorney's office.

May 29

Restorative Justice and Curbing Youth Violence.

Professor Laurie Ross of Clark University will chair a discussion of restorative justice, an innovative approach to law enforcement that changes the model of crime and punishment and instead brings victims and perpetrators together to explore ways to make restitution and repair broken relationships. Restorative justice also has the potential to improve school disciplinary procedures, to reduce suspension rates and to reduce delinquency.

Laurie Ross is an Associate Professor of Community Development and Planning in the Department of International Development, Community, and Environment at Clark University. Ross engages in collaborative research with community partners on youth and gang violence and youth worker professional development. Ross coordinates the HOPE Coalition, a youth-adult partnership in Worcester.

April 12

Life in Palestine

Octavia Taylor and her husband Stephen spent the fall 2014 semester living and volunteering in Palestine. Stephen taught a computer programming course at Birzeit University and Octavia worked with Jeff Halper, Director of the Israeli Committee Against House Demolitions. She will report on the complexities of Israeli-Palestinian conflict and look at how daily life for Palestinians has been affected by the Israeli Occupation.

The Taylors have lived five semesters in the Middle East, including a time in Syria for the 2009-10 academic year. Octavia has worked as a community organizer and manager of grants primarily for environmental and social justice projects at Clark University. Stephen teaches Computer Science; his research in applying computers to the Arabic Language has brought him to the Middle East.
