What is the “CIAD” ?

- **Commission for International Aid and Development replaced Territorial Technical Commission (TTC) in 2010**
- **12 members (SVP Volunteers & International Office Staff)**
 - **4 Board members**
 - **1 Coordinator**
 - **7 Correspondents**
- **Meets every 6 weeks approx.**
- **Reviews and Follows-up Request for Assistance from countries**
- **Human and Natural Disasters; Emergency & Rehabilitation**
- **Development projects**



How does CIAD work?

- **Correspondants prepare & advise on requests**
 - 3 for Africa
 - 1 for Middle East
 - 2 for Eastern Europe
 - 1 for America & Asia
- **Work closely with the structure**
- **Review & discussion in meeting**
- **Decision & Funding**
- **Partnerships / twinnings**
- **Follow-up reporting**

Funding of CIAD

- **DONATIONS** from countries are the...
ONLY SOURCE OF FUNDING
- Appeals after major disasters
- Spontaneous donations (General Disaster & Solidarity Fund)
- ‘All funds go to the poor’ (no levy for CIAD administration)

CIAD receives almost no donations outside major appeals (disasters with global media coverage like Philippines, Haiti, Iraq...).

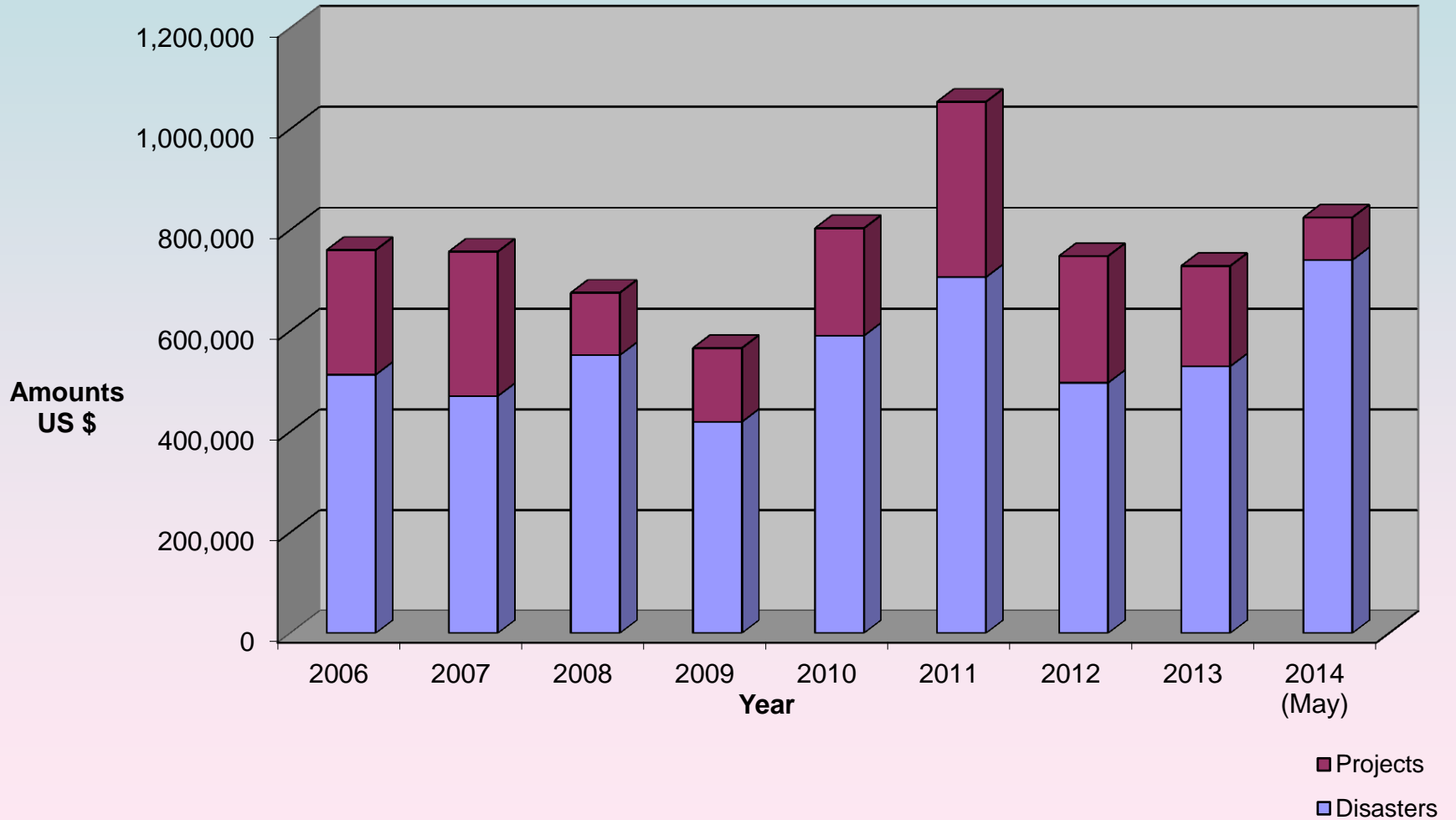
As CIAD respects donors’ wishes, it CANNOT FUND development or rehabilitation projects in countries outside these appeals !





Funding by CIAD

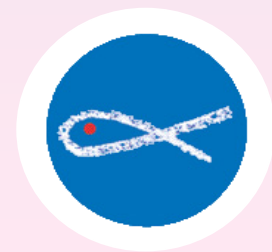
2006 – 2014

Funding in 2013:

\$ 728,499 to 29 countries

Disasters : \$ 529,711 (73%)

- **Philippines super-typhoon Haiyan (emergency help)**
- **Haiti (Micro credit program with FamVin)**
- **Emergency assistance** in 16 countries after disasters : food, medicines, water, blankets, emergency shelters: War (Syria, DR Congo, Central African Rep.) & War refugees, Floods, Cyclones, Earthquakes...
- **Rehabilitation projects** in 10 countries after disasters
 - Basic assistance programs (Malawi, Mozambique, Syria, Uganda...)
 - House reconstruction, repairs & equipment (Dominican Rep, Sri Lanka, Philippines, Burkina Faso..)
 - Self Help projects and Education (Togo, Sri Lanka, Mozambique...)



Funding in 2013: \$ 728,499 to 29 countries

Projects: \$ 198,788 (27%) in 14 countries

- Professional Training (Uganda, Senegal, Jerusalem...)
- Education (library in Botswana with SSVP Ireland, school fees in Turkey, computer training in Lebanon...)
- Construction of a School in Vietnam (with SSVP France)
- Cybercafé in Cameroon; help to catering service in Lebanon...
- “Pencil project” in Dominican Republic (with Canada Youth)



Funding so far in 2014: \$ 824,571 to 20 countries

- **Disasters : \$ 740,430 (90 %)**

- **Emergency assistance** in 11 countries after disasters (63,500 €)
(South Sudan, Solomon Islands, Chile, Balkans...)
- **Rehabilitation projects** in 4 countries after disasters (303,637 €)
(Construction of houses in Burundi, Zimbabwe, Philippines; Feeding program in Haiti)

Super Typhoon Haiyan (Philippines):

House construction and repairs; School assistance (scholarships, material, meals), Pencil project

- **Development: \$ 84,141 (10 %)**

- **Agricultural Development in Peru (with SSVP Canada); Malawi**
- **Professional Training in Guinea-Bissau**
- **Daycare center in Mozambique**

\$ 500,000 to 6 countries in 2014

Typhoon Haiyan in the PHILIPPINES...

\$ 1.3 million donated

\$ 110,000 sent in 2014

(reconstruction & repairs, education)



3-5 year Rehab plan on reconstruction, health, education, training...

Some of our projects...

Disaster Rehabilitation effort:

\$ 500,000 to 6 countries in 2014

Outside major appeals...

Construction of 30 houses for flood victims in Zimbabwe : \$ 23,000

**Construction of 10 Houses in Burundi (with the help of Belgium):
\$ 38,000**

Purchase of Generators for two homes for Elderly in Syria: \$ 32,000

CIAD strives to respect donors' wishes

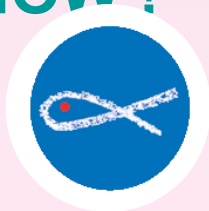
MOST of the smaller projects CANNOT be supported without a properly funded **General Disaster & Solidarity Fund**

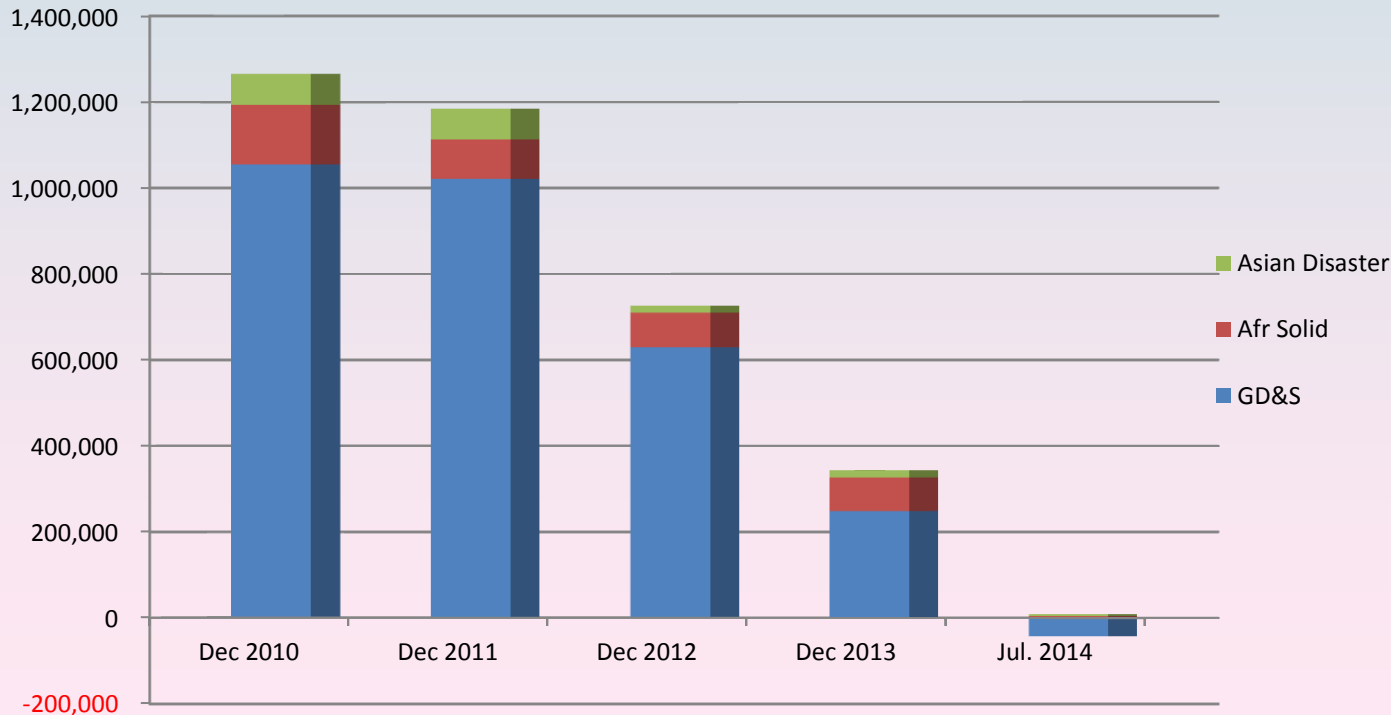

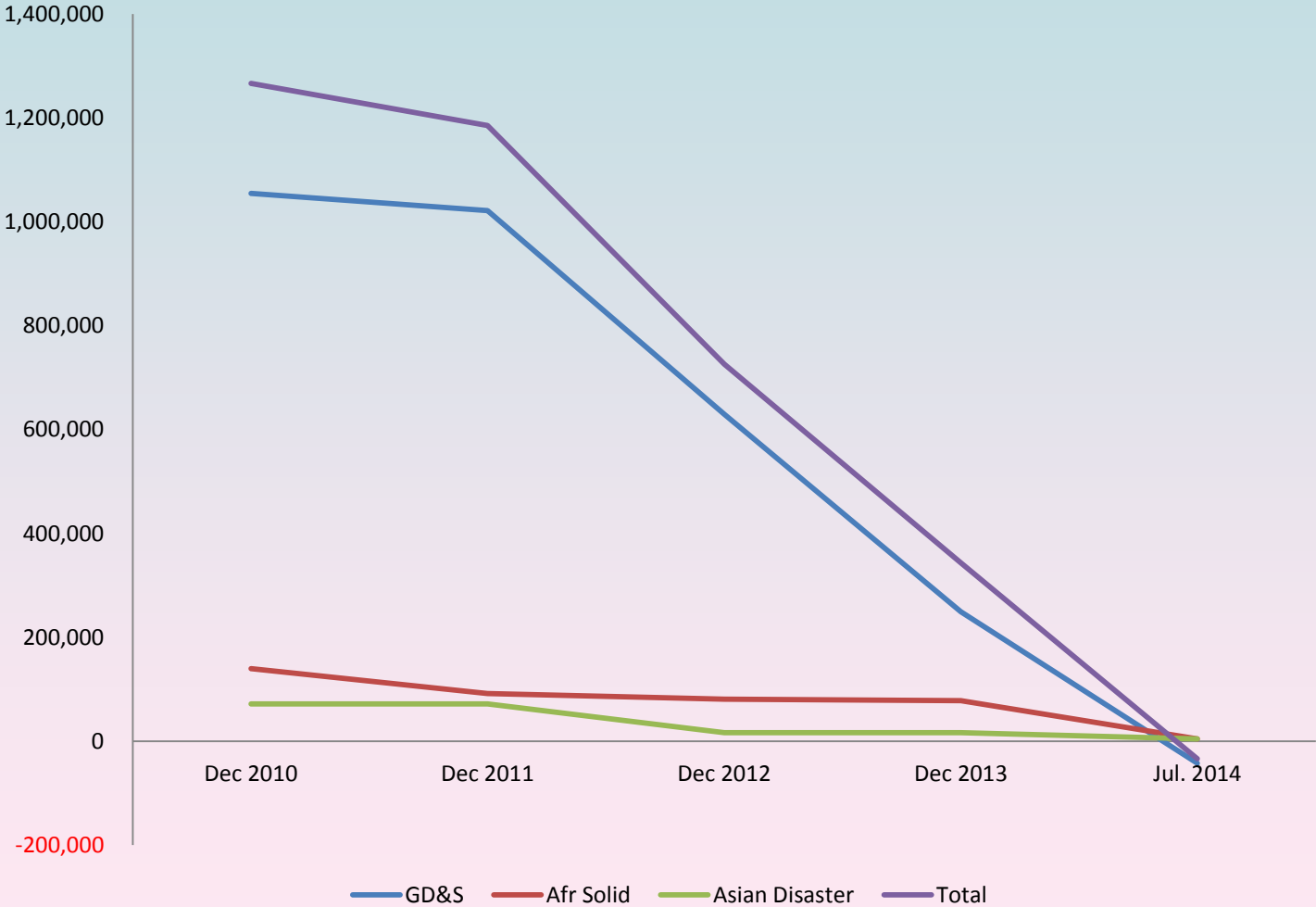
